Aircraft, Boat Show Will Open in L. A. Saturday

The largest aircraft and boat show in the country was promised California today by H. H. Wetzel, vice-president and general manager of the Douglas Aircraft Company and president of the California Industries Association, Inc., sponsors of the second annual national aircraft and boat show when it opens its doors in Los Angeles for a nine-day showing next Saturday.

According to Wetzel more than \$2,500,000 worth of the "last word" in airplanes, boats and accessories will be on the floor of the Pan-Pacific auditorium when the show opens. The planes, show officials disclosed, will range from the smallest licensed airplane in the United States, the Rose Parakeet, to the huge air transports or air yachts and deluxe club transports of the Douglas and Lockheed type.

One plane which is expected to capture the public fancy because of its novelty is the Waldo Waterman "aero-autoplane" which was just recently completed in Santa Monica. It can be driven thru the streets as an automobile at 70 miles an hour, or with wings attached at the airport can be flown with its automobile engine at a top speed of 120 miles per hour.
