Scott Has Hard Luck at Fresno

Inter-City Teams Meeting at Monticello
 800 LEAGUE BOWLS SERIES MATCH HERE TONIGHT

If B. J. Scott, electrician, hunter and bowler of note here, had scored three points more in the Mid-State Bowling championships held recently at Fresno he would have won the diamond medal for the all-events division of the big meet.

This was learned this week from The Fresno Bee which reported the big bowling tournament in detail. William Garcia of Fresno won the medal. Said the Bee: "Garcia's 1,973 total for the all-events diamond medal held off all challengers altho B. J. Scott of Torrance came within two points of this mark. Scott had hard luck on a pocket hit as he rolled five 200 games out of nine with scores of 241, 238 and 234 topping the list."

Participate in Doubles The local Westinghouse Refrigerator bowling team from Torrance scored 2,740 for 24th place in the team division of the Fresno tourney and the Union Ice squad of Torrance scored 2,615. Beside Scott, other local bowlers who competed in the all-events division were J. Sommers, who bowled 1,891 for sixth place and L. Pesce whose 1,870 gave him ninth place.

J. Sleppy and Scott scored 1,265 for eighth place in the doubles of the mid-state tourney while Rebadow and Sommers bowled a 1,247 for 13th. Rebadow's 676 qualified him for eighth place in the singles division and Pesce's 661 was good for 15th.

Another series of games is scheduled tonight at the Monticello Bowling academy on Carson street between teams entered in the Inter-City league. The games will start at 8:30 o'clock. This is the sixth week of the 10-week schedule being run off by six teams each Monday and Thursday nights.

Zamperini never challenged the older runner, apparently being content to pace him through the grueling event. When Bright "turned on the heat" Zamperini could not overtake the sprinting Bright. As result, Zamperini was about five yards behind the winner, who set a new Compton Invitational meet record of 3:58.3. A close battle that may be decided only after the relay is run is expected to develop tomorrow (Friday) afternoon in the Marine League track and field meet finals between Leuzinger and San Pedro for the varsity championship. The meet will be held on Leuzinger's field, beginning at 2:30 o'clock. Both schools exhibited their prowess in the field trials Tuesday. Leuzinger set the pace with eight qualifying places in sprints and hurries.

Narbonne's Gauchos appear to have the Class B flag already in their possession, having scored 291 1/6 points in the finals for the field events which were held Tuesday for that division and Class C athletes. The Gauchos' nearest opponents are El Segundo's Class B tracksters who rolled up 191 1/6. The other schools in the league scored as follows: Torrance, 41 1/6; Leuzinger 32 3/4; Gardena 25 1/6; San Pedro, 1.

The winner of the Class C title lies between Leuzinger, San Pedro and Narbonne. In Tuesday's finals for the field events, the scores made were: Leuzinger 19; San Pedro 15 1/2; Narbonne 12 1/2; El Segundo 5 1/2; Gardena 4; and Torrance 3 1/2.

Three new records were made in the preliminary meet. Narbonne's Hirata, running in the Class B 100, was clocked in 40.23 which broke Johnny Schmidt's mark of 10.3 set last year. Hirata's time also equaled that of the best varsity heat in the preliminary meet. Narbonne established a new mark in the Class A 120-yd. high hurdles, running that in 15.8s. This is not strictly a new record because the hurdles have been lopped off three inches from their height last year. Tony Nady high jumped into a second place in this division.

In the Class C pole vault, Ziegenfeld of Leuzinger leaped 11 ft. 5 1/2 in., for a new record. Temps of Narbonne and Zeigler tied equalled the 50-yd. record of 5.6s when they tied for first place in that event. Bill Stewart was third in the high jump for this classification.






