PARIS (U.P.)—There are two outstanding styles for summer hats—the sailor and the halo hat—and both styles are shown in hundreds of variations. One thing seems to have been decided upon and this is to retain the shallow and flat crown. Brims frequently soar eight or even ten inches above the head at rakish angles but the crown remains fitted close to the top of the head.

For day wear, the most popular choice seems to be the classic sailor with a stiff brim and a two-inch crown. Trimming varies from the tailored band and bows of grosgrain ribbon to the military cockades of feathers, small flags, as well as bunches of flowers. The trimming invariably is bunched at the front of the head. Breton sailors, despite the fact that they have been worn for three or four years, remain in style. These hats, with the brim turned up all around are worn either on the back of the head or at a cocky angle over the right eye.

The off-face hats can be small touches with an upward movement or shallow bits of grosgrain that resemble a large hair ribbon perched on the back of the head. These hats are so tiny that trimming is unnecessary and flowers and feathers are dispersed with for small tailored bows of grosgrain ribbon.

There are innumerable varieties of the halo hat. Some turn up just in front, others turn up back and front. Still others are worn at a rakish angle with part of the brim jutting way up to the side. These, too, are usually left untrimmed except for a simple band and bow of ribbon.
