Individuality New Note In Modern Beauty Culture; Imitations Are Out

Schiaparelli has created 12 dresses for Miss West and her buxom curves, fussy details and pinkish mauve shades of the '90s have had considerable influence on new clothes. Broad-brimmed hats with turned-up, flaring brims show the greatest influence of the '90s, and Madame Schiaparelli wears one in black felt with the brim turned up sharply in black.

Most of Miss West's new clothes are in the colors so popular 40 years ago—shades of lilac, fawn, pink combined with black and pale yellow. There is a lilac taffeta dress with a pleated bodice and flounces at the bottom of the skirt. It is trimmed with embroidered motifs of white sequins and puffed flowers of white chiffon.
