"Primed and loaded are the nation's youngsters this week in preparation for a banging, booming Fourth of July, which will see about \$3,000,000 worth of pyrotechnics go up in smoke.

"Firecrackers, Roman candles, and skyrocketers comprise the larger purchases by Young America. Much confusion exists as to firecrackers vs. salutes. Manufacturers state firecrackers are up to two inches long, salutes from two to five. 'Safe and sane' agitation keeps salutes down to five inches.

"In the South more firecrackers are used at Christmas and New Year's than on the Fourth.

"Pyrotechnics are sold the year round, and the most unusual use of them is attributed to a South American general who kept an attacking army at bay for several hours by the use of the more noisy and colorful varieties.

Ban All Fireworks in County's Mountain Area

Stocks Will Be Scanned for Fire Menace

No fireworks of any kind will be permitted in the mountain area of Los Angeles county, as a safeguard against fires, according to Spence Turner, county forester and fire warden.

Merchants' stocks thruout Lomita and other unincorporated territory will be carefully scanned by deputies of the fire prevention bureau and by captains of fire companies to see that no fireworks on the banned list are displayed or sold. County ordinances specify what kinds may be sold. It was explained.

"It is unlawful to sell or possess any firecrackers, salutes, bombs, chasers, skyrocketers, Roman candles, triangle wheels, pin wheels, balloons operated by means of any flame, or any fireworks, dynamite, phosphorus, nitroglycerine or other explosive substance or article capable of causing a conflagration," Turner explained.

There is no objection to the "safe and sane" varieties, however, except in watershed areas. These types, include fountains, lawn lights, colored sprays, pyroscopes, sidewalk spinners, cap pistols, paper cap torpedoes and many others.

Cooperation of the public in promoting a safe Fourth of July is urged, and a call to the county fire prevention bureau with regard to illegal fireworks will bring a deputy out to investigate. Merchants who have illegal fireworks in stock in unincorporated area run the risk of having their stocks confiscated, in addition to a maximum fine and sentence of \$100 and 30 days.

Orders went out to all division headquarters and patrol stations for a careful watch to insure that no fireworks of any kind are discharged in the mountains, where the danger of forest fires is always so great. Turner also ordered the County Fire Prevention Bureau and captains of engine companies to make a careful survey of merchants' stocks to see that no fireworks on the banned list are displayed or sold.
