AROUND HOLLYWOOD FILM LOTS

HOLLYWOOD. (U.P.)—Hollywood screen stars, long afraid of color, now have lost their fears and consider tinted films an aid to their careers.

The experiences of Marlene Dietrich, Janet Gaynor, Joan Bennett, Warner Baxter and other stars have proved to them that color is not a menace.

When colored films first were introduced Miss Dietrich flatly announced: "I will never make a color picture."

She and others were swayed against color by the jaundiced appearance of stars in early color pictures. Since that time new lighting and makeup have been introduced especially for the color pictures.

To overcome this prejudice

against color, studios asked the makeup experts to devise means of making the stars appear natural. Max Factor, a veteran among makeup artists, said he experimented six years with makeup for technicolor films before he permitted the results to be tried in a picture.

The new makeup has been used in Walter Wanger's "Vogues of 1938" with the result players found they photographed even better than they did in black-and-white pictures.

"With the aid of the correct makeup," Factor declared, "the stars appear on the screen in their natural shades, which brings out the beauty of their eyes, the coloring of their hair and enhances their appearance."

TOUGH FIGHT IN NEW FILM

What is described as the toughest fistic battle ever put on a movie screen is that now starting tonight, where Warner Bros.' pugilistic drama, "Kid Galahad," with Edward G. Robinson, Bette Davis and Humphrey Bogart as stars, is the feature attraction.

This is an 11-round slugfest between Wayne Morris, sensational new player, and William Haade, ex-steel worker, who was taken off the skeleton of a New York skyscraper to be made into an actor.

Morris in "Kid Galahad," Robinson is his manager. Double-crossing the boy, Eddie sends him to slug with Haade, who

The boy does, and in the 11th round puts the K.O. on the bigger man. Morris weighs 195, Haade 210 pounds.
