Aquaplane Race August 1 Has Many Entries

The two most famous of all women speed boat pilots, a half dozen socialites, several well-known yachtsmen, a college girl, a couple of football stars, several life guards, a motion picture cameraman, a postman, a policeman, a fireman and a garage foreman, are among those who have signed up as entries in the Third Annual Aquaplane Race from Catalina to Manhattan-Hermosa August 1.

Dot Munson, nationally recognized speed boat racing champion, and Loretta Turnbull Richardson, winner of the international championships as speed boat pilot, will drive against each other for the first time in the Aquaplane race this year. Bunnie Seawright, 28-year-old Hermosa Beach socialite, will ride the aquaplane behind Miss Turnbull's boat, while Lou Sawtelle, 19-year-old Los Angeles Junior College girl will be towed by Miss Munson.

In the field against these two women's teams, will be at least 23 men's teams. The questions the dopesters are asking now is, can a woman's team win against the men? Bunnie Seawright rode last year. She finished ninth in a field of 21. At the end of the race she was in a better physical condition than many of the men riders. TORRANCE'S own Louis Zamperini returned last Saturday night from his eastern athletic tour. As fans know, Louis won first place in the Princeton Invitational meet, running the two mile trip. Louis said that he could have run the distance in much faster time if he had been pressed, and if it were not for the strong wind during the meet. He fully believes that he can travel the two mile jaunt in nine minutes flat. Eastern critics consider the local boy as the best 5000 meter man in the United States. It seems as though Louis is as popular in the east as on the coast; he claims that he had writer's cramp for two days after the Princeton meet, signing requested autographs. He was a guest of Jack Dempsey, former world's heavyweight champion for two days and was a guest of honor during Dempsey's birthday dinner, his seat was next to the former boxing idol of the world. During the Princeton run, Louis was spiked and was also a guest of one of New York's large hospitals for two days, under treatment of a doctor.

After spending several days "seeing" the sights of New York and turning down offers to run in several eastern meets, he visited relatives that he had not seen since he was two years of age. Louis and a fraternity brother returned by automobile to Yellowstone National Park, where Louis was again a guest of friends for several days, fishing and visiting places of interest before he returned to his home town, Torrance.

Besides many souvenirs of the several states that he visited, Louis brought home a gold stop-watch, his first place award for the two mile run, and a beautiful silver platter, from Princeton officials, with the signatures of all athletes that competed in the meet.

Louis enters summer school at U.S.C. next week, and plans to devote the rest of his vacation to studying and preparing for the coming semester. By returning to school he had to give up a trip to either Japan or Europe, but plans to make one of these trips next year.

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
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
