Labor's Share Of '36 Steel \$ 10% Above '29

Labor's share of the steel industry's dollar was almost 10 percent greater in 1936 than in 1929, according to a study made by the American Iron and Steel Institute showing 38 1/2 cents out of each dollar of the industry's gross revenues last year went into the pay envelopes of its employees.

Dividend payments to steel stockholders amounted to 4 1/2 cents out of each sales dollar received in 1936, while tax payments to federal, state and local tax collectors consumed another 4 1/2 cents.

Comparison of the distribution of the steel dollar in 1936 with 1929 revealed that 3 1/2 cents more of the steel dollar went into payrolls last year than in 1929 when payrolls took 35 cents. Stockholders' dividends in 1936, however, were only 50 percent as much of the steel dollar as in 1929, when they amounted to 9 cents out of each dollar received by the industry.

Naval Flying Forces Featured in Film Drama

The comedy reflects the lightheartedness of modern youth and the spirit of the times.





