(Continued on Page 1-A) dueced to a six-inch and then a two-inch outlet to each service connection. Also included were fire hydrants 600 feet apart. Most of those attending the council session this week were in favor of installing a smaller system which would serve the purpose now but which, they admitted, would not meet future needs as the North Torrance area develops.

Another point at issue was the North Torrance delegation's "understanding" that the city would make them an outright "gift" of 35 to 40 percent of the cost of installing the water system. Leonard and members of the council pointed out that the city could not do this legally because the city cannot contribute from its general fund to place pipelines any place outside of Municipal Water District No. 1.

More Interest Essential
 In presenting his conception of how the Arlington avenue section of North Torrance could be served with domestic water lines, the engineer explained that the petition asking the city to consider plans for this were signed by property owners of only 27 percent of the property, 39 acres, involved in the proposed district. He suggested at the outset that it would be advantageous to any plan for water service to gain the interest of a larger representation of property owners.

Before any district is created, an exhaustive survey must be undertaken to conform to the state's Debt Limitation Act. Because much of the property of the proposed water district is included in the Alondra Park assessment district and all is affected by Mattoon Act assessments this will be a big job.

"The city must learn to what extent the property is involved with the Metropolitan Water District and the County Sanitation district in addition to those other assessment charges," he pointed out. This will take several weeks to determine.

Has Figures Available
 Then Leonard swung into his plan to provide water service to the new area (except for private wells) in Arlington avenue section. This contemplates the location of a master meter at 182nd street where the city would connect with the Moneta Mutual Water company's line and obtain the water. An eight-inch line would be laid to 174th street where it would be reduced to a six-inch line and then continue easterly on 17th to the boundary of the district and westerly on 168th a distance of 510 feet. Eight fire hydrants should also be installed, for which the city would pay the \$2 monthly charge for each, along the route. Many questions were asked of Leonard by men and women

Irish to Build Large Residence in Riviera Tract

Construction of the largest home to be erected here so far this year began this week as Mr. and Mrs. Leland A. Irish of Ocean Park, launched work on their eight-room frame stucco residence and garage at 317 Calle Mayor in Hollywood Riviera. The residence will cost \$12,500, according to the building permit issued by City Engineer Frank R. Leonard.

Irish is the head of a large Los Angeles construction company while his wife is a well-known club woman and president of the Hollywood Bowl association. The only other building permit issued this week went to Mrs. E. A. Jacobsen who is adding a wood frame laundry room, six by 20 feet, to her home at 3134 285th street. The work will cost \$100.

from North Torrance, most of them concerning the cost and method of payment for this proposed water service. Leonard had figures available to show the expense to each property owner. He had calculated that the water bonds necessary to finance the work would run to 10 years at six percent interest. The cost would be approximately 18.5 cents per front foot for the first year, which would be reduced each year until in the last year it would be about 12 cents per front foot. This expense would be in addition to the regular water charges.

The Trade Exposition is to be a permanent display of products grown and manufactured in the Southwest and will include exhibits by many foreign countries. The exposition will be open the year round. In 1942 it is planned to expand the trade exposition into a much larger affair in commemoration of the 400th anniversary of the landing of Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo on these shores.

The site will be submitted by the South Los Angeles communities, lies midway between downtown Los Angeles and the harbor. It is bounded by Normandie and Biggs roads between 190th and 182nd streets. Named on the committee to formally present the site on August 15 to the "Committee of 15" are: Dale Clanton, Gardena, chairman; Supervisor Leland H. Ford, Judge Frank Carrell, L. J. Gilmeister of Torrance and others.

20 Million Project
 Elaborate illustrated maps and even moving pictures of the site will be included in the presentation. It is also planned to secure a million signatures on petitions requesting that the "Midway site" be chosen. At a recent Los Angeles election, the Bureau of Water and Power was authorized to use its credit to the extent of \$1,200,000 for the purchase of an exposition site. The exposition will entail an expenditure of \$20,000,000 to stage, according to McAtee, manager of the major "Committee of 15."
