Hopes to Win Thrift Champ Tells Secrets

MINNEAPOLIS (U.P.)—Mrs. Hans Michelson, championed by her neighbors as Minneapolis' thriftiest woman, flatly refuses to patronize manufacturers of garbage cans.

"Garbage cans," she says, "are for those who are careless. I think there is a use for everything."

Mrs. Michelson, 73, claims she has never thrown anything out. In the first lesson on thrift she pointed to a pile of papers she is saving.

"Most people," she said, "would keep the papers for a cold day and toss them onto the fire. They'd have a quick blaze and then ashes. The correct way to burn paper is to soak them in water, roll them in bundles and let them dry. They last longer that way and give much more heat."

No Tin Cans

The tops of vegetables and corn cobs, after they have dried, also make excellent fuel. Mrs. Michelson has no cans to dispose of, for she does all her own cooking and baking. And there are few leftovers at the table.

"Through experience," she said, "I have learned to cook just what people like and then I know I won't have to throw anything away. I have reared four sons on this principle and they're all husky."

Bones go into soup and then are tossed to the dogs. Crumbs go to the birds. Coffee grounds clean out grease in the drains, tea leaves hold down the dust in sweeping, melon rinds are converted into pickles, potato peelings and melon seeds are used for fertilizer.

Current bushes, plum, apple, peach and lemon trees grow in her yard. Only the currant bushes and apple trees have produced fruit so far, but Mrs. Michelson has high hopes.

And her husband? "Oh, he's just like any other man. He hasn't found any use for his old razor blades. But I take them away from him before he has a chance to throw them away and use them to rip out threads when I sew."
