Their sturdy young grandson, Clarence M. Allen, became the 993rd young fellow in the United States to be awarded the highest honor in the gift of the Boy Scouts of America when the quartermaster badge of the Sea Scouts was pinned on his uniform at the climax of a simple but very earnest and dignified ceremony in the Elks' lodge rooms at Monterey Monday evening.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Allen, and 11-year-old brother, Gene, witnessed the ceremony from seats on the rostrum with the exalted ruler of the Monterey lodge. Young Allen, who lived with his grandparents here in 1930 and was a member of the Scout troop No. 3, has been active in the Monterey Sea Scout unit since its inception. He won his Eagle Scout rank several years ago. Now attached to the U. S. S. Dobbin, destroyer tender at present in Mare Island navy yard, Allen obtained a two-weeks' furlough to finish tests for the quartermaster rank and took an additional four days' leave to come to Monterey and receive his badge.

Milk Survey Reveals 44-Pct. Goes Into Butter

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—Forty-four out of every 100 pounds of milk produced in the United States is churned into butter, according to the Consumers' Council of the Department of Agriculture.

Of the remaining 56 pounds, 41 are used in fluid form, six eaten as cheese, four poured into cans in the form of evaporated or condensed milk, three made into ice cream, and the rest consumed by calves and used in miscellaneous products such as malted milk, powdered milk, and so on.

Scenic Beauty Hides Big Guns at Point Loma

SAN DIEGO, Sept 9 (U.P.)—Historic Point Loma is being converted into one of the strongest fortified points in the world—a veritable Gibraltar—to protect San Diego harbor, where the U. S. Navy maintains its largest base.

Working quietly, the U. S. Army is installing the most modern of coast defense guns upon the jutting point, which is regarded as one of the seven most beautiful views in the world.

Well Guarded

Used often by motion picture companies as a "location" when filming pictures in which Honolulu's famed Diamond Head appears, much of the Point is forbidden territory for tourists as the Army proceeds with its fortifications. Armed guards halt all automobiles at the two entrances and warn against sketching. Cameras are forbidden.

While army officers are loath to discuss the work being done, there is every indication that soon Point Loma will become the most strongly fortified spot in the continental United States.
