Deanna Delivers Songs for New Type Recording

Deanna Durbin, 14 year old soprano, continues to take screen hurdles in her stride with calm consistency. Her latest display of this poise in the pinches was given when she recorded songs of Universal's "100 Men and a Girl," which opens tonight at the Torrance theatre.

These songs were recorded by a new method originated by Leopold Stokowski, noted orchestra conductor, who appears with Deanna in the picture. Because the necessary equipment was available only in Philadelphia, Deanna made the trip from Hollywood to do her singing.

In the Philadelphia Academy of Music, as Deanna stood with a score of microphones and 100 musicians around her, the little star knew that she was on a spot, figuratively and historically. Deanna knew this recording experiment was costing the studio \$5,000 a day. She was aware that no one was sure, then, how the multiple channel recording system would turn out, although later it was found to be a marvelous improvement.

Knowing all that depended on the result, Deanna stood up to the massed mikes and sent her soprano voice pouring forth as freely as the songbirds in the trees. She sang the Drinking Song from Verdi's "La Traviata" and Mozart's "Alleluia." The playback registered perfect recording. Deanna proved she was equal to delivering her best performance, even under strange conditions and in special situations when much depended on her. Then she returned to Hollywood to begin playing her part with Adolphe Menjou, Alice Brady, Eugene Pallette and Mischeva Auer.
