

# Here are Some New "Fixins" For That Thanksgiving Feast

No need to tell you how to cook your Thanksgiving turkey, but here are recipes for some novel accompaniments that you will appreciate for the "big feast."

## Famous Spaghetti Supreme

A tasty, satisfying luncheon dish  
1 lb. spaghetti  
1 can beef broth  
1/2 cup buttered crumbs  
1 lb. veal, diced  
1 can peas  
Salt and pepper  
Parboil diced veal and peas in beef broth, seasoning to taste. Strain out veal and peas. Parboil spaghetti in salted, boiling water. Drain. Into a well-greased baking dish place alternate layers of spaghetti, veal and peas. Repeat until all ingredients are used. Finish with a layer of spaghetti on top. Add the broth. Cover with buttered crumbs and bake in a moderate oven. Serve hot. Makes 6 generous servings. Macaroni, egg noodles, sea shells or any other form of macaroni products may be substituted for spaghetti in this recipe.

## School Cafeteria Gaining Patrons; Serves 70 Daily

Under the direction of Mrs. Marion Carstensen, the Lomita Elementary school's cafeteria that was re-opened this year is gaining additional young patrons every month and now is serving approximately 70 children and nearly all of the teachers each day. A regular lunch is served for 10 cents. This includes two hot dishes and a drink. For nine cents three hot dishes are available and for 14 cents three hot dishes and a drink may be obtained there. Included on the five-day menu are: soup, which is served every day; choice of carrots, peas, beans, spinach or other vegetables, fresh fruit or vegetable salad, puddings, pie or cake for dessert and milk, chocolate or orange juice.

## Delicious Pumpkin Pie

1/2 recipe pie crust  
2 cups shredded coconut  
2 cups mashed cooked pumpkin  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 teaspoon mace  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon allspice  
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
3 tablespoons melted butter  
3 eggs, slightly beaten  
2 cups milk, scalded  
Line deep pie plate with pastry, rolled 1/4 inch thick, allowing pastry to extend 1 inch beyond edge. Fold edge back to form standing rim; flute with fingers. Combine 1 1/2 cups coconut and other ingredients in order given; mix thoroughly and pour into pie shell. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 20 minutes, then reduce heat to moderate (350° F.) and bake 20 minutes longer. Sprinkle remaining 1/2 cup coconut over top of pie and bake 10 minutes longer, or until custard is firm and coconut a delicate brown.

## Huck Finn Lives Again at School

Huckleberry Finn, freckles, straw hat, red hair, overalls and barefooted, marched thru the halls and into the various classrooms of the Orange Street elementary school last Friday. In real life he was ten-year-old Raymond Halladay of Lomita but Mark Twain could have used him as a model for the boy whose adventures along the Mississippi have been read by millions.

"Huck" Halladay was just one of many book characters who came to life last Friday at Orange Street school when Book Week was observed by all grades. With his bandaged toe, he led the morning-long procession of boys and girls who traveled from one to another carrying their classes' favorite books and telling other youngsters about the stories they found between the covers. Among the books thus honored were The Three Little Pigs, Under the Story Tree, Calico Bush, Billy and Terry and Zeke the Raccoon. Miss Hilda Jellison, principal of the school, reviewed the touring booksters before they started together. Trim off surplus pastry. Bake 35 minutes in a hot oven (400° F.). Note: One cup apricots is sufficient for this recipe. However, 2 cups may be used, making a large pie, serving eight. The 1 lb. 14 oz. can furnishes 2 cups fruit.

Break mince meat into pieces. Add apricot juice and sugar. Place over heat and stir until all lumps are thoroughly broken up. Bring to brisk boil; continue boiling for one minute. Allow to cool. Line a 9-inch pie plate with pastry and fill with mince meat mixture. Place drained apricots evenly on top. Place upper crust on filled lower one and press edges firmly

## DRAINAGE OF SLOUGH UP TO L. A.

The Bixby Slough problem was shunted over to the Los Angeles city engineer's office late last week, following a conference of county officials and interested organizations and individuals at the Hall of Records.

The conference was called by County Surveyor Alfred Jones and Flood Control Engineer C. H. Howell at the request of the board of supervisors, following the appearance of F. M. Andiani, former Los Angeles harbor commissioner, before the board recently. City Engineer Frank R. Leonard of Torrance is a member of the investigation group.

Original cost estimates for the draining project made by Engineer Leonard were accepted by the committee and were submitted with its report. Leonard estimates the cost of the drainage canal at around \$80,000. "After considerable discussion, the committee unanimously agreed that there was not sufficient information at hand to enable it to make a recommendation requested in the board's order, and since the slough is in Los Angeles city, the committee felt that the city engineer was the logical person to make a complete investigation and report," the committee report stated.

Cite Four Purposes The following purposes should be kept in mind, the committee decided: (1) Use of the area for park purposes in which case a lake might or might not be maintained. (2) Drainage of the area either completely or in part, and its use as a storage reservoir or regulating basin in connection with a canal from the slough to the harbor. (3) Reclamation and protection of the area, having in mind it would be used for subdivision purposes. (4) Development of a barge canal to be used for industrial purposes in connection with the harbor.

The committee recommended that the city council be asked to instruct the city engineer to make the investigation and report, and that the flood control engineer and the county engineer be authorized to cooperate in a joint report to the city and the county.
