Torrance's Tartars and teams from 11 other high schools of the L. A. City school district will participate in the Carnival. The teams will be divided into two divisions representing the northern and southern sections of the district. The 12 teams will be paired off against each other and each pair will play for a 15 minute period. At the end of each playing period the ball will be declared "dead" where it is, and the next two teams will take up the game from that point. Constituting a continuous game of six 15 minute periods, this promises to be the greatest football spectacle of the year.

Last year 65,000 persons witnessed the Carnival, and \$6,000 was realized for the welfare and nutrition work of the P.T.A. It is expected that the returns of this year will be considerably exceeded this year. The 12 high schools participating in the football contest are: South: Torrance, Banning, Gardena, Jefferson, Manual Arts and Roosevelt; North: Bell, Fairfax, Los Angeles, Marshall, North Hollywood and San Fernando.

PRO GAME FLOPS; FOG VEILS SHOW

Gardena, however, will appear in the P.T.A. Grid Carnival at the Los Angeles Coliseum tomorrow afternoon, playing against Marshall high school.

San Fernando, winner of the so-called "minor" city championship, was undefeated, had no ties and no points scored against them—the only Los Angeles city team with such a record. Manual Arts by defeating Marshall, 34 to 7, claimed its 16th straight victory, and the third city "major" title in the last four years.

Bell high school's eleven which meets the Torrance Tartars at the Coliseum tomorrow was tied 6 to 6 by Huntington Park Friday in an interlocking game.

Coach Bernie Donahue's Alexander Hamilton squad crushed Canoga Park, 46 to 0, and Leuzinger defeated El Segundo, 3 to 0 in a heavy fog. The latter two teams were formerly in the Marine league.

Gardena's first-string players who will probably not see action at the Coliseum free-for-all are George Robertson, too old; Jack Stephens, who is also over 21 now; Glynn Burns, Ed Lack and Bill Townsend recovering from injuries.
