Writer Has Tabbed 31 Out of 44 All-League Picks

Since the close of the 1936 Marine league grid season, Robert "Sports Shots" Lewellen of The Herald staff has—as he says—"been sticking my chin out with my own All-Marine picks weeks ahead of the official selections." Here's how Lewellen has scored:

1935—eight of his first team nominations were confirmed.

1936—seven out of 11.

1937—seven out of 11.

San Pedro filled the remaining two positions and, for the first time in many years, not a single Narbonne Gaucho was honored.

The selection of J. D. Radford, end; Leonard Harris, tackle; Max Coast, halfback, and Capt. Leo Rossett, guard, was particularly gratifying to The Herald's Sports-Shooter, Robert Lewellen. He tabbed Harris and Rossett for All-Marine honors three weeks ago.

Lewellen "called" the selection of seven All-Marines approved by the S. C. board. They were Lack, Gardena, and Harris, Torrance, tackles; Craig, San Pedro and Rossett, Torrance, guards; Martin, Gardena, end; Burns, Gardena, halfback, and Robertson, Gardena, fullback.

Not a single Torrance player received second All-Marine team mention but three Narbonne players, Whitacre, end; Cook, guard, and Mertz, halfback, were named on that string.

County Disease Figures Gain But Cause No Alarm

Although there was a 21 per cent increase in cases of reportable disease last week over the previous week, there is no cause for alarm, county health department statisticians said this week.

The increase is not sufficiently above the average for the corresponding weeks of the past five years. Diphtheria almost doubled, and the mumps and scarlet fever almost doubled. Diseases that ran above the average included German measles, pellagra, lobar pneumonia, poliomyelitis, smallpox, tuberculosis, and typhus fever. Social diseases also were reported on the increase.

Last week's hopes that animal rabies was being brought under control proved false, the figures showed. There were 31 new cases of rabies during the past week, as compared to the same number the previous week.

Armed Bandits Rob C. C. M. O. Yard

Two bandits, one armed with a revolver, robbed the C.C.M.O. plant yard last week of equipment valued at \$50, according to a report given local police by the private detective agency which guards the location.
