Edison Offers To Cut Lighting Cost to Cities

Efforts to band a group of 10 or more Los Angeles county cities into a group that would retain a rate expert to seek substantial reduction in their municipal overhead street lighting costs from the Southern California Edison company by order of the State Railroad commission will be held in abeyance for 30 days.

In the meantime, according to information given 24 city officials meeting here last Thursday before the County League of Municipalities dinner session, details of the voluntary rate reduction offered by the power company are to be made public by the railroad commission.

With Peter E. Binder, El Segundo mayor, presiding the group learned from J. M. Russell, utilities rate engineer for the county mechanical department, that such a voluntary slash in the overhead power bill has been submitted to the railroad commission for investigation and report. This action is expected within 30 days.

Russell said he had learned from the power company's street lighting engineer that a "substantial reduction on all overhead lighting costs is proposed for all districts served by the Edison company except a few isolated mountain areas."

The cities' group had previously heard representatives from Inglewood, Lynwood and Redondo express their communities' willingness to enter the "ten city plan" whereby each city would retain L. W. Stewart, Los Angeles rate expert, to prosecute for the reduction for a fee of \$350 per city. Hawthorne, Maywood and City Engineer Frank R. Leonard for Torrance indicated that their councils were interested in the "ten city plan" but had made no definite commitments.

The street lighting group will meet again in Pasadena next month to consider the report on the voluntary slash in the power rates and either decide to accept that reduction or continue to seek enough cities to carry on the effort for a greater cut.
