

Griffith Park Site Urged for 1940 Fair

Site of the permanent trade exposition to be established in Los Angeles in 1940 and the 1942 world's fair commemorating the 400th anniversary of Cabillo's discovery of California will be the northeast corner of Griffith Park, on land now owned by the public, if the committee in charge follows the advice of Fred H. Howard, veteran Los Angeles horticulturist and landscape expert.

The \$1,500,000 tentatively earmarked site would go a long way towards the construction of the building, Howard said, if the site he suggested was used.

About a score of proposed sites have been submitted to the committee by realtors and property owners and decision is expected to be announced soon. Old Machado-Lake, a marshy area east of Torrance has been advocated by one civic organization which points out that the land can be acquired at low cost, drained and thus turned into a desirable area for adjoining residences.

1/2 cup Spry (now triple-creamed shortening) 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind 1 1/2 cups sugar 3 cups sifted flour (cake-flour preferred) 3 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 cup canned pineapple juice 1/2 cup water 4 egg whites

Place over rapidly boiling water and beat constantly with rotary egg beater until mixture holds up in peaks (about 7 minutes). Remove from fire, add lemon rind, and beat until cool and thick enough to spread.
