Deft Clowning by Irene Dunne Film Highlight

Irene Dunne scores mightily in the year's choicest comedy role as Lucy Warriner in "The Awful Truth," which opens Saturday at the Torrance theatre. The total has jumped from \$939,000 per month in the past year and the number receiving aid increased 150 percent during the last two years. Recipients of aid in these classes rose from 20,033 on Jan. 1, 1936, to 46,138 on Jan. 1, 1938.
