Beach Clogs of Last Year Become Today's High-Soled Evening Sandal

CHICAGO (U.P.)—Beach clogs with 3-inch soles for evening wear, fabric shoes in multi-colored stripes, and patent leather pumps in pastel shades will share the spotlight in women's footwear fashions for the coming spring and summer, according to Ruth Kerr, co-director of the National Shoe Fair Style Review.

The most striking innovation is the high-soled sandal, first seen early last fall on the beaches of the French Riviera, Miss Kerr said. Made of balsam wood, it was originally designed to lift the wearer above the sands. It proved such a boon to shorter women that manufacturers are now showing models, finished in gold, silver or mahogany for evening wear. Hidden under long dresses, they add inches to the shortest debutante.

Four new colors apparently will dominate spring wear. In order of their popularity they are Paris and Marine blue, copper, and Rose Berry, a wine shade of red much softer than Dubonnet. The Paris blue is lighter and somewhat richer than navy; Marine is darker. Fabrics, such as gabardine and challis, will be equally popular with leathers. Asymmetrical and flowered designs and stripes will be featured for summer afternoon and evening wear. Two-tones are more in demand than solid colors.

A newly fashioned hi-lo heel, slightly higher than the present Cuban heel, will be seen on most street shoes. The toeless and heelless models of last season will be continued with opening smaller and more modest. All shoes will be tailored or draped, Miss Kerr said. Lacing designs on toe and along the instep add to this effect. A peasant influence is felt on some models that show a moccasin stitching along the sole.

Satin and mesh combinations are being shown for the more formal evening wear.

Chief Stevenson Nears 15th Year On Department

(Continued from Page 1-B) and arrived here May 14, 1916. While working at his trade here, Stevenson also served as extra policeman at times like Halloween and big gatherings when the police department's regular personnel was not enough to perform the additional services desired. That service gave him the idea of putting in an application for fireman and it wasn't long until he was appointed. The first paid fireman of the city—and he went on duty when the city's first truck, a pumper which is still in service at the central station, was delivered. Ten years later he became chief of the department.

Chief Stevenson says that the hardest and longest fight he ever had to extinguish a fire was an oil rig blaze in 1924 near Narbonne and Sepulveda. It took the department six hours to bring that inferno under control. Last week, when he dashed into a smoke-filled room at the Erwin hotel, he breathed in so much smoke and hot air that his throat became affected and he counts this as the most serious injury he has yet suffered in the line of duty.

Unusually Low Loss But for "close calls," the chief remembers all too well the agonizing moments several years ago when he narrowly escaped being run over by the rear wheels of the heavy ladder truck. This occurred while firemen were laying a line of hose to a burning Standard Oil tank. "Ollie" missed his footing and hung beneath the vehicle by two fingers for a distance of 30 feet before his predicament was noticed by other firemen and the truck was stopped. Had he let go it is likely he would have been fatally injured.

Chief Stevenson is very proud of his department and its modern equipment. One item of the latest—a fog nozzle—which transforms a fog of water into a spray which is particularly effective in fighting interior fires with a minimum of water damage. This type of nozzle, purchased some six years ago, is also effective in combatting oil fires. But without trained men, a fire department cannot operate efficiently and trained men is what Fire Chief Allan D. ("Ollie") Stevenson has to assist him in keeping Torrance fire loss to the unusually low per capita cost of only 11 cents last year.
