Woman Baker Aids Campaign

Assisting in the plans for a national campaign for the greater consumption of bakery products at a meeting Tuesday in Los Angeles, Clara Lewis, owner-manager of the Carson street bakery of that name, was named on an important committee for that purpose by the Retail Bakers' Association of Southern California.

"We want to make people better acquainted with the many products their home-town bakeries have to offer and hope to demonstrate that we are in a position to furnish the finest grade of foodstuffs ever offered the public," Clara Lewis said.

The local business woman has had more than 18 years' experience in her line of work and is one of the three women master-bakers in California.

She came to Torrance about a year ago after the depression had almost knocked-out her business in Los Angeles and Inglewood where she controlled some 15 establishments.

She is a charter member of the Soroptimist club of Los Angeles, women's organization similar to Rotary International, and is a member of the Torrance Business and Professional Women's club. She employs a baker, his assistant and a girl clerk here and reports that her business is showing steady gains.

U. S. Steel Earnings in 1937 Reported by Directorate

Board of directors of the United States Steel Corporation at a quarterly meeting held this week in New York announced net income available for dividends for the fourth quarter was \$4,577,983 which is equivalent to \$1.29 per share preferred for the quarter.

The earnings for the year were announced as \$99,930,836, equivalent to \$8.58 on the common stock for the year of 1937. The Board also declared a dividend of \$1.75 on preferred stock. No dividend was declared on common stock. The balance of surplus for the year of 1937 with all charges deducted was announced as \$27,881,905.

'Devil's Island' Built for 'Zola'

Half the town of Laguna Beach turned out recently in various states of dishabille when a cannon was fired without warning on their beautiful beach.

The alarm was soon quieted when it was discovered that a group of cameramen and players from Warner Bros. were merely making a scene for "The Life of Emile Zola," which opens Sunday at the Plaza theatre in Hawthorne.


