Labor Financed "WPA" Suggested as Possibility

TOLEDO (U.P.)—Arthur G. Howard and C. L. Fling have a big idea they want approved by the workers of the nation. Both were laid off by a Toledo manufacturing. They conceived the idea of contributing a quarter or a half dollar to a fund—with which labor would finance its own WPA.

"We want to find out what the working men and the employers of Toledo think of our idea," they explained. "We would like to see it tried out in Lucas county. If we succeed, the rest of the country could take it up." They said the plan actually germinated from an incident which happened to Howard several years ago. Misfortune overtook him while he was a farmer in western New York. His neighbors planted his crop of oats.

U. S. C. Scholarships Are Announced

Thirty-five tuition scholarships for high school and junior college students throughout the United States have been announced for 1938-39 at the University of Southern California.

The awards cover tuition costs of \$285 for the freshman year of 25 graduates of high schools with enrollment of more than 200 students. Ten scholarships are also given to graduates of accredited junior colleges.

All applications must be filed before April 15, with the scholarships to be awarded on or before June 1. Applicants must stand in the highest tenth of their class in scholastic achievement and must have the recommendation of their principal. They must also graduate either in February or June of the current year.

FRANCHISE PAYMENT

A check for \$1,056.27 was received this week from the Southern California Edison for the city franchise. City Clerk A. H. Bartlett told the city council Tuesday night.

The loin lamb chops pictured above are served with pears tinted red. This platter, decorated with fresh mint and served with green peas and Park-house rolls, is sure to please that very special guest.

Lamb chops, like beef steaks, are better for broiling when cut thick, so when you want to make a very favorable impression, Inez S. Willson, home economist, suggests that you choose double lamb chops. Thoroughly pre-heat the broiling oven with the regulator set at "high." Place the thick chops on the broiler rack so that there is a distance of about three inches between the top of the chops and the flame or heating element. This distance insures the chops from too rapid browning. If the distance must be less, reduce the temperature accordingly.

When the chops are nicely browned on one side, season them with salt and pepper, turn and finish the cooking on the second side. Always serve broiled lamb chops very hot, so serve them immediately when the broiling is completed. The pears are tinted by reheating them in syrup to which red fruit coloring or red cinnamon candies have been added.


