## Utilize Small Garden Space

Don't pass up a garden because you have but a small space of ground, or because you think the soil is poor. Any small area will raise something even if only a bit of lettuce and radishes, and by following one crop with another, you can have a whole season's supply.

## Straight Rows Best for Gardens

While good vegetables will grow in crooked rows or even if the seed is broadcasted over beds, the work of cultivating and caring for the plants is immeasurably reduced if the seed is sown in straight rows. Make the trouble to stretch a line, and mark the row with exactness; it will save hours when the time comes to push a wheel hoe down the aisle between them.

Rows running north and south are best to let sunshine reach the soil after the plants are well grown. Distance between the rows may vary considerably. In small gardens, well supplied with plant food, rows of low-growing crops may be as close as 6 inches.

Time was when the only "visual education" school children enjoyed was the pictures in their text books. Washington crossing the Delaware, a volcano in eruption, an artist's conception of King Arthur and his Knights of the Round Table. Today, "visual education" goes far beyond those print pictures and enters the field of sound motion pictures. The result, according to Merle R. Helbach, principal of the Torrance Elementary school, is better understanding of "the social problems of existence" for all school children.

Helbach intends to bring to the 860 boys and girls in his school the largest number in the institution's history. As many of the "approved" educational films as he can during the remaining months of the year.
