Council Attends to Varied Civic Business Tuesday

With two candidates for councilman positions, Frank H. Egger and Joseph M. Wright in the audience, the city council transacted the following civic business Tuesday night:

SYMPHONY STUDY . . . At the request of the Torrance Musicians Society, Mayor William H. Tolson appointed Councilman Tom McGuire and George V. Powell to "study the furtherance of the Torrance Symphony for the 1938-39 season." The resolution was taken on the Society's request that \$300 be allocated for "the performance of one concert and one opera this year to be known as the good-will performances."

TREE TROUBLE . . . Because he well knows the future that brews "every time we either trim or remove trees on El Prado," Councilman James Hitecock demanded a full investigation by the entire council of F. C. Winkler's request that an eucalyptus tree at 1507 El Prado be trimmed "because it gives too much shade and prevents flowers from growing." The council will make a field trip to the location Saturday noon.

GRANT LICENSE . . . A business license and permit to operate a pool hall at 23200 Narbonne avenue was granted R. J. Stubblefield, who operates a similar establishment in Lomita.

MOVE KAIN GAUGE . . . SALARIES FIXED . . . Ordinance No. 302, fixing the salaries of the city clerk at \$225 (\$25 more than at present) and city treasurer at \$60 (\$10 increase) was given final approval and adopted.

DELAY RE-ZONING . . . City Attorney John E. McCall reported that further action on the proposed city-wide re-zoning ordinance would have to be postponed until City Engineer Frank R. Leonard recovers from his illness.

SAND SUIT . . . Any litigation deemed necessary to halt the nuisance of sand blowing from a cultivated field of Torrance boulevard and Cedar street would have to be brought by property owners affected by the "storms" and not by the city. City Attorney McCall ruled. This disturbance was called to the attention of the council last week and McCall was instructed to give an opinion on whether or not the city was authorized to sue.

APPROPRIATIONS . . . A tank of oil for alley improvement was purchased for \$75 and \$25 was appropriated for this city's subscription to the Southwest District Highways association formed here last Friday night. (For story on this organization see page 1-B).
