Warning that no permanent results from the dog quarantine can be expected until from one to three months after the ban became effective, because the incubation period for animal rabies is that long, County Health Officer J. L. Pomeroy this week reported that the malady again had risen above the average in cases reported during the past week. The weekly average for the year to date is 31 cases.

Smallpox remains mildly epidemic, with 16 new cases reported. Including all reportable diseases, there has not been a week this year in which the actual total was as great as the average for the corresponding week of the past five years.

## PAPER SENT STATE LEGION AUXILIARY FOR REVIEW

"... it takes more than words between government leaders to maintain friendship among nations. Movements for peace must have the wholehearted support of the common people to be successful."

So wrote Coral Lindeman, Torrance high school student, in her first-prize winning essay among 27 submitted on the subject: "The Spirit of Fidac as Exemplified by the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier." She was presented with a \$5 award this week by Mrs. Eloda Darkdull who was in charge of the contest for the local American Legion Auxiliary.

Marion Spuehger won second prize of \$3 and Martha Reeves and Patty Post were given honorable mention by the judges, Mrs. Dorothy Jamieson, Mrs. Julia Correll and Grover C. Whyte. Miss Lindeman's essay has been sent to the State Legion Auxiliary headquarters for the regional contest and the national winner will receive a \$200 educational scholarship. Her contribution follows:

Fidac Aims Today  
"In Arlington Cemetery stands the tomb of the Unknown Soldier, a beautiful and impressive memorial to the millions of men who gave their lives in the most devastating war the world has ever known—a war which was fought to end war, and to make the world safe for democracy. The other countries who participated in the war also erected monuments to their Unknown Soldiers and war dead. In spite of different customs and foreign languages, the countries were drawn together in mourning for those who fought and died for a common cause."

"The nations fought side by side when their security was threatened by war. The nations should also be united in times of peace, to insure the continuance of life, happiness, and freedom. In 1920, the Legionnaires founded an organization for the purpose of promoting friendship among nations. It is known as Fidac, and is a federation of former allied combatants. It is an international organization. Eleven countries are Fidac members: United States, Great Britain, France, Italy, Belgium, Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia, Greece, Portugal, Rumania and Poland.

"The aims of Fidac can be classified in two divisions—those in the interest of the members, and those in the interest of the world at large. The ideals are to unite the ex-service men of foreign nations in a binding friendship, to care for the dependents of the war victims, and to keep reverently the memory of the dead. Fidac intends to work for world peace, to prevent the spreading of false news, to act as mediator in solving the nation's difficult problems, and to instruct the younger generation in the spirit of Fidac.
