


# Urge Business Women to Unite in Support of Candidates, Equal Rights

### PRODIGAL PARENTS by Sinclair Lewis:

This is Lewis in light vein, readable and full of ideas. Readers who look for Nobel Prize treatment and literary gestures will not find them. Publishers describe it as "the revolt of parents against the revolt of youth." Lewis draws an amusing and ironic comment on a social situation; a sincere portrait of ourselves, made at a psychologically fortunate time.

**JOURNALISTS' WIFE** by Lillian T. Mowrer:

This book is a new and brilliant version of the foreign correspondent in the midst of world events by an author who is the wife of E. A. Mowrer of the Chicago Daily News. The best sections are those which show the rise of Mussolini, then Hitler to supreme power in their respective countries. For Mowrer the collapse of democracy in Italy and then in Germany was not merely a story; his hopes and emotions were involved, and the moral earnestness of the reporting raises it above the average. This book reflects all this. Beneath the charm of easy style, anecdotes, personalities and asides, we see serious observations and in every chapter view a "chunk" of post-war European history through the author's eyes and feel it through her honest sympathies.

### A SON OF SCOTLAND by R. H. Bruce Lockhart:

The author of those widely read volumes "British Agent" and "Return to Malaya" has given us a far different canvas and characters in his last book. Lockhart is a pure Scot, half Highlander, half Lowlander, who was educated in Scotland and he gives a just picture of life and training in Public Schools.

There are accounts of the holidays spent in the Highlands as well as school terms spent on the windy East Coast and in the noble city of Edinburgh. Some hard commentary on the collapse of Highland economy and Highland habit of life is included. There is little in the book to remind one of that very individual "British Agent" or the emotional coloring of "Return to Malaya" and one feels he has not been able to achieve a really good depiction of the land he loves.

## Local Club Hears Address by President of L. A. Group

Bessie Stewart, president of Los Angeles District Federation of Business and Professional Women, in speaking before the Torrance club at a dinner meeting in McDonald hall on Carson street Monday evening urged women to band together. "When two candidates each having the same qualifications seek like positions," said Mrs. Stewart, "we as Business and Professional women must choose carefully. If one is a woman such case we should support the woman."

Result of a survey of business and professional women throughout the country proves that women work of necessity and not for pin money as many would have us believe, she declared. This survey, undertaken at the request of the International Labor office for the League of Nations (which is trying to discover the existing political, civil and economic status of women in various countries) was compiled from data given by 12,000 women. More than 10,000 reported dependents in their various households.

Mrs. Stewart stressed the need of clubwomen to support the equal rights bill. She praised the manner in which local clubs assist in vocational training work, and advised them to urge young women to refuse to copy from their older sisters but to carve new careers. She pointed out how women should be interested in city government because "they are the ones willing to campaign for better laws, better schools, better health and happiness for all."

Mrs. Stewart, who came from Moss, was accompanied by Elizabeth Buss, recording secretary of the Bay District Section Business and Professional Women. Gertrude Ralston was also a guest at the dinner.

Table decorations suggested April showers with the rainbow and pot of gold forming the centerpiece at the speakers' table. Colored silk parasols turned upside down and filled with sweet peas of red, yellow and lavender were centerpieces on adjoining tables. Miss Ada Chase was in charge of the decorations. The meeting adjourned early so that club members might attend the city council session and see their member Harriett Leech installed as city treasurer. The nominating committee, composed of Margaret Wright, Edna Mullin and Florence Welch, will give its report and officers for the ensuing year will be elected.
