Boyle Enters Congress Race

... pressure causes switch
James J. Boyle, Democratic Assemblyman from the 66th District for the past six years and prominent in Los Angeles business circles for the past 17 years, has announced his candidacy for Congress from the 17th District, to succeed the late Charles J. Cullen.

Boyle's record as a public official led to his being chosen as the chairman of the Los Angeles County Assembly delegation. Boyle's incumbency in the California State Legislature, it is said, is marked by the great number of important bills of national interest that he has sponsored as well as by his service as chairman of the Revenue and Taxation committee and three-time member of the Ways and Means committee of which he is now the senior Democratic member.

Boyle's decision to become a candidate for Congress, instead of for the State Board of Equalization, as originally intended, is due to the pressure of his friends and supporters who have pointed out that he is the natural successor of the late Congressman Cullen, his announcement states. Friends also point out that objectives for which Boyle would strive as a board member are being carried out by the incumbent and to defeat him would require "a vast amount of campaign funds which could be obtained only through sources disciplined by the board and to which element he does not aspire to become indebted."

Boyle lives at 1918 West 73rd street with his wife and two sons. He has seen service in the Navy and the Naval Reserve, is a member of the American Legion and of the Executive Committee of the Retail Druggists Association of Southern California and is interested in civic and philanthropic work.
