

PORK CHOPS and APPLES... A Tried and True Combination



Pork chops and apples are an old, old combination which is always appreciated. When—where this combination was first served is lost in antiquity, but surely the person who started it must have been a real epicure of foods for the tart flavor of apples by contrast enhances remarkably the succulent flavor of pork.

Pork chops are a very delicate and tender meat which deserves to be cooked slowly. Long, slow cooking in a covered utensil develops their delightful flavor and makes them the most popular of meat dishes, welcomed wherever they are served.

The method of cooking pork chops is known as braising. They may be dredged with flour, then they are nicely browned on both sides, seasoned with salt and pepper, covered tightly, and allowed to cook very slowly either on top of the stove or in the oven until done. The length of time needed for cooking depends upon the thickness. Chops cut one inch thick need to be cooked about forty-five minutes. It is much better to have pork chops cut thick, at least an inch, because then they can be nicely browned on the outside while on the inside they are so tender and juicy that they can be cut easily with a fork.

The apples shown in the above illustration are rose apples, apples which have been cooked in a syrup-flavored and tinted with cinnamon candies.

Rose Apples
6 Jonathan apples
1 cup small red cinnamon candies
1 cup water
2 cups sugar

Pare the apples. Boil water, sugar, and candy until it threads. Then cook apples gently in this a few at a time, turning often, until tender and red all over. When finished, pour the remaining syrup over the apples.

Another excellent way of combining pork chops with apples is by stuffing the chops with an apple dressing. For stuffing, pork chops are cut double thickness, and a pocket made in the center. If this pocket is cut from the side next to the bone, it is not necessary to use a skewer or toothpick to close the cavity after the dressing has been inserted.

as the membrane on this side contracts when heated and holds in the dressing. Stuffed pork chops are cooked in exactly the same manner as any other pork cuts, by braising.

Apple Stuffing
2 slices salt pork, diced
1/2 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup chopped onion
1 cup bread or cracker crumbs
1/2 cup chopped parsley
5 tart apples, diced
1/2 cup sugar
Salt and pepper
Fry salt pork until crisp and remove pieces. Cook celery and onion in the fat for two or three minutes. Put in the diced apples, sprinkle with sugar and cover. Cook slowly until tender. Add crumbs, pieces of salt pork, and season with salt and pepper. Stuff into cavities in pork chops.

\$90 Fee May Limit Seekers for Judgships

With the opening of the period—June 1 to June 25—in which candidates for office must file nomination papers, the 18 Superior Court Judges against whom one or more persons have filed declarations of intention to become candidates today waited to see if these opponents were sufficiently serious in their intentions to put up the \$90 filing fee required by law for the first time this year.

Only those who filed declarations before May 27 are eligible to file nominating papers. For that reason, three judges against whom no opponents filed, will be automatically elected at the primary August 30. Seven of the remaining 18 judges whose terms expire this year have only one opponent, and thus their fates will be decided at the primary.
