


SUPERVISORS MUST PARE COSTS DOWN

Efforts to slash another \$2,293,388 from the preliminary 1938-39 county budget in order to hold the tax rate at its current figure of \$1.41 per \$100 valuation, today engaged the attention of the board of supervisors.

Unless this reduction is made in the various departmental demands for next year the tax rate will be \$1.50, budget experts advised.

As the preliminary budget stands to date, after much trimming, the gross increase over this year's budget is \$9,388,444. This is partially offset by \$6,701,056 in increase in revenues from the state for county charities, bringing the net increase to \$2,687,388.

Action of the board in voting against all group-advance salary increases will top off another \$394,000, bringing the actual net increase to date to \$2,293,388.

The appeal of 5,000 extra county employees against a proposed slash of their pay from \$5 to \$4.50 per day, planned to save \$100,000 a year, was taken under advisement by the board after a hearing.

Incumbent Judges Opposed by Pair for Inglewood Township Benches

Four contenders for Justiceships, Nos. 1 and 2 of the Inglewood township court appeared this week to seek voters' endorsement in the August primaries. The incumbents, Judge Frank Carrell in office No. 1 and Judge A. F. Monroe in office No. 2 are seeking re-election. They are opposed by Attorney Torrance C. Welch of this city and Collamer A. Bridge, Hermosa Beach police judge.

When the Lomita and Redondo Beach townships were merged with Inglewood for economic reasons in 1934, the board of supervisors held that one justice could not attend to all the court business. Consequently Monroe was named to assist Judge Carrell of Gardena and the supervisors recently created two places for judges in the township.

Judge Frank Carrell was the first to be elected Justice of the Peace of the enlarged Inglewood township created by the merger of the former Inglewood, Redondo, Lomita, La Bamba and Gardena townships, embracing all the territory in this county south and west of Los Angeles city boundary lines. The present township has a population well in excess of 100,000, and includes eight incorporated cities. Carrell was elected in 1934 from a field of seven candidates.

Before that he had served as Justice of the Peace of Gardena township, during which incumbency he served as Judge of Los Angeles Municipal Court in Los Angeles for three years and one year in the branch court at San Pedro, by assignment of the State Judicial Council. He has also served as Judge Pro Tem of the Superior Court.

Carroll holds court in Gardena, Torrance and Redondo. It was through his cooperation that the branch court in Torrance was established, after the county closed the former court here in July of last year. At that time the city council tendered the use of the city courtroom for this purpose and Judge Robert Lessing was appointed clerk on a part-time basis in charge of the office here in Torrance.

Since taking over the office he now occupies, Judge Carrell has handled in the three departments where he presides a combined total of 7,035 cases, of which 2,370 were criminal, 530 civil, 1,660 small claims, and 2,475 traffic. Appeals have been taken in less than one-half of one percent of the cases heard by him, and so far as is known his decisions have been universally sustained.

Judge Carrell has established a reputation for fairness and moderation in fines and sentences imposed in criminal cases. Judge Carrell is a Mason, Shriner, Elk, Legionnaire, and a member of other organizations. He is a graduate of the University of Southern California, holding degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Juris Doctor from that institution. He has resided within this district for more than 35 years, and has been endorsed for re-election by leading citizens throughout the township.

Attorney Welch, a native of New York who came to California in 1904, said yesterday: "I feel I am as well qualified as the incumbent and have had a broad experience in legal matters which I desire to place at the service of the people. I believe I have an understanding of what folks in the smaller cities served by the Inglewood Justice court want from their court and I shall endeavor at all times to give impartial, factually-based opinions. As far as Torrance and Lomita are concerned, I will do everything possible to serve the best interests of justice for their residents, as well as those who live in adjoining towns."

In less than two weeks Welch is going east to attend the 25th reunion of his Yale graduating class. On his return he plans to conduct a vigorous campaign for the justiceship.
