PARIS (U.P.)—Do your fur shopping early! The wise woman who doesn't wait until the furrier is over-run with fall business will get her winter coat ideas while the sun bolls. And Paris has a lot of suggestions already. You need not feel that if you cannot afford a fur coat, because the fur-trimmed cloth coats promise to be as smart, and sometimes more so.

But if you want all fur, mink, astrakhan and beaver look like heavy favorites. Astrakhan, whose all-purpose and well-wearing capabilities have already won it great popularity, forms a majority of the fur coats displayed in mid-season collections. There is a new tendency to combine it with another fur, such is the case with one of Heim's outstanding offerings.

This coat has a sleek piece of black galleack inset for a belt on the black astrakhan; a stand-up collar allows for the new brushed-up coiffures, while wide epaulettes supplant the wide and padded shoulders of last year.

Fur experts and Paris dress-makers agree that mink is most effective when its skins are pieced together in straight vertical lines. Diagonal designs and tricky collars or sleeves more often detract from the general effect of the fine fur than add to it.

Beaver is turned into a fascinating and indescribable fur when it is shaved and dyed blue-black. Heim uses it for a dressy hip-length jacket. Another of his innovations in fur styles is the use of glinton (wolverine) in a short cape. In fact, many animals which hitherto have been held in no respect now are becoming popular.

Prairie fox, with its yellowish tint, is being introduced as a more sporty substitute for silver fox. Molyneux makes a three-quarter, short-sleeved sports coat of the prairie foxes. Paquin makes five fat ones to make an evening cape which fastens at the neck with wide black satin ribbon. For a daytime cape, Paquin uses natural beaver. The straight line of its three-quarter length is broken only by two slits forming armholes.
