Local Resident Recalls Attending College's First Graduation Program

News accounts of the colorful ceremonies marking the 55th annual commencement exercises of the University of Southern California brought back many dear memories to Mrs. Ella J. Hills of 2844 236th street. She remembers when, as a little girl, she attended the first graduation for the Methodist college which became the institution known as U. S. C.

Mrs. Hills accompanied by the late Judge R. M. Widney and his family traveled by horse-car, whose capacity was only 10 or 12 persons, as far as the Santa Monica railroad track, now 40th street, to reach the institution which has flourished into the great university of today. Mrs. Hills came to Southern California in April 1881 and lived with her older sister and brother-in-law on the old Hazard property at Third and Broadway. This land was owned by "Grandma" Hazard who crossed the plains in about 1851, a journey taking about two years.

Another memory connected with Methodist college which is treasured by the local woman concerns the time, back in 1882, when she was called into the Widney dining room with the Widney children to hear grace that preceded the first dinner-meeting of the board of college directors and their wives.
