PHONE COMPANY SUES CITY FOR TAXES

Lomitans Seek Injunction

An injunction to restrain the Standard Oil company and others from diverting water from the Pelos Verdes Hills across the property of Mr. and Mrs. John Anderson in Lomita is sought in an action filed this week in Los Angeles county superior court.

W. M. Covington and Verna Willis also were named as defendants, in addition to the oil firm.

Damages totaling \$4,380 also are asked of the defendants by the Andersons who are claiming that the diversion of waters made in August of 1936 caused destruction of their property last March 2.

The Anderson property is used for agricultural purposes, and includes an orchard and vineyard, as well as the usual farm buildings, and chicken houses.

Postage Stamp Bought to Assuage Conscience

DECATUR, Ind. (U.P.)—A conscientious-stricken farmer paid a rural postman 3 cents with this explanation: "Several years ago I sent a letter through the mails using a stamp on which I had erased the cancellation mark. I want to reimburse Uncle Sam for that."

\$2,000,000 Refund Sought in Action

The city of Torrance and Los Angeles County are named defendants in a suit for some \$2,000,000 in taxes paid under protest by the Southern California Telephone company, in an action on file this week in Superior Court.

Amount demanded from the city of Torrance is \$673,333, while the county is asked to repay \$1,005,316. The city of Gardena is asked to pay \$275, Redondo Beach, \$86, and Hermosa Beach, \$70.

The Metropolitan Water District also is made a defendant in a separate action, and asked to refund \$122,411 to the utility company. All 33 cities in the county are sued.

The telephone company, one of the country's most valuable public utilities, paid its 1937-38 taxes under protest, and the claims are all based on the levy made for this year.

Claim is made that the state board of equalization, which fixes the value on all public utility property, placed an excessive valuation on the telephone property in the 33 municipalities and unincorporated area of the county.

Meanwhile, the county's suit against the telephone company, seeking to force the utility to obtain a franchise in unincorporated area of the county, has been continued until June 21. It had been scheduled for trial Tuesday.

The company also has suits pending for recovery of taxes paid to the 33 cities and the county for previous years, none of which have come to trial as yet.

Funeral Held for Mrs. Mark Wright

Funeral services for Mrs. Mark A. Wright, who passed away early Monday morning at a Los Angeles hospital after a lingering illness, were held Tuesday afternoon at Stone and Myers' chapel with Rev. B. C. Brewster, pastor of the First Methodist church, officiating. Interment was at Roosevelt Memorial Park cemetery. Mrs. Wright, who was 61 years of age, had resided here for the past 22 years.

She was survived by her devoted husband, Mark A. Wright of 1306 Anapala avenue, who has long been associated with the C.C.M.O.; two daughters, Miss Mary Elizabeth Wright of this city and Mrs. Marion Maddon of Southgate; a son, Mark A. Wright, Jr., of 1419 Beech street; a brother, F. Howard Tuttle of Los Angeles, and two grand children, Marca and Judith Wright of this city.


Convent to Graduate Nine Local Pupils
