

# 499 Pupils to Graduate in Nine Torrance and Lomita Schools

## 141 ENDING HIGH SCHOOL CAREERS ON JUNE 22 AND 23

The complete list of boys and girls who are advancing from the elementary and junior high school schools and graduating from the high schools in Torrance and Lomita was compiled this week from records obtained from principals at the respective institutions.

The list shows 141 high school graduates (72 from Torrance, 69 from Narbonne—the largest classes in the history of both schools), 204 Junior high school students who will enter high school next fall (100 in Torrance, 104 in Narbonne) and 154 elementary pupils.
