LIMERICK JUDGES AWARD \$3 TO MRS. ELSIE MARTIN
Poetic Form Stymies Many Entrants in The Herald's Tag-Line Contest

Judges summoned to The Herald Monday to pass on the scores of entries for this newspaper's Father's Day limerick contest announced last week they were surprised at the number of local residents who apparently are unfamiliar with the ancient and traditional poetic style of this form of composition.

Many of the entries had to be marked down because they did not follow the rule for limericks the world over—that the last words in the first, second and last lines must scan and rhyme. Failure to follow this style cost many a candidate for the \$3 award his or her chances to collect.

The judges' final decision went to Mrs. Elsie Martin of 1304 Date avenue this city who voted the best limerick-liner. Her tag-line to the poetic tribute to Father's Day:

'Old Chicago' Represents 18 Month Job

History is slow in the making, and the movie men have found just as slow in the re-making. In the current 20th Century-Fox offering, "In Old Chicago," which makes its debut at the Plaza theatre in Hawthorne on Saturday the major part of the picture's action deals with that hectic year 1870-1871, climaxed by the historic fire in October of the latter date. And the records of the studio show that it required a year and a half of intensive effort to bring that story to the screen. As a matter of fact, it required three months of shooting just to film the events of two days—those dread days of October 8th and 9th when the blaze was at its height.

Tyrone Power, Alice Faye and Don Ameche have leading roles, supported by Alice Brady and Andy Devine. Supplementing them are a host of important featured players, among them Brian Donlevy, Phyllis Brooks, Sidney Blackmer and Berton Churchill.

More than in scenic and costume detail is accuracy preserved. It was no simulated terror which gripped extras and players on the set during the fire scene, when, for example, a herd of cattle were loosed to create the stampede of fear-maddened beasts from the stockyards. The players knew it was only a movie, but the cattle didn't, and it required the exercise of elaborate precautions to prevent serious injury.

Around Hollywood Film Lots

HOLLYWOOD (U.P.)—A black screen to open the picture—an off-screen voice—impressionism—an uneasy "knocking" song—done-in-the-manner-of-Kipling—"Boots"—these are a few of the innovations which Fritz Lang has developed for his latest picture.

Because his ideas were bound to cause excitement in the film industry, Lang kept them a secret until just before the film was previewed.

"When in Hollywood," explained the director, "don't take any chances with ideas. If they like one of your ideas, they will put it into a 'quickie' and beat you to the screen with it."

Lang, the man who made "Fury" and "You Only Live Once," can be depended upon for startling departures in technique.

In his current "You and Me," he introduces the theme of his picture in plain language by the device of the off-screen voice.

After the title credits are screened, the film dissolves into blackness. Then the voice gives the theme of the story—

"You can't get something for nothing—

A musical cord follows.

"And only a clump would try it."

The camera fades into a department store and the voice goes into a poetic recitative, stating that health, beauty, and even the bare necessities of living must be paid for.
