The name of the first college founded in America is Harvard, which dates back to 1636.


To begin with, Pennsylvania was land granted to William Penn in 1681 by King Charles of England.

The words of the Psalmist, "We will rejoice in thy salvation, and in the name of our God we will set up our banners," are the Golden Text in the Lesson-Sermon on "God" on Sunday in all Churches of Christ, Scientist.

A Sermonal selection in the Lesson-Sermon includes these verses from Matthew: "Then was Jesus led up of the spirit into the wilderness to be tempted of the devil. . . . Again, the devil taketh him up into an exceeding high mountain, and sheweth him all the kingdoms of the world, and the glory of them: And saith unto him, All these things will I give thee, if thou wilt fall down and worship me. Then saith Jesus unto him, Get thee hence, Satan: for it is written, Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and him only shalt thou serve. Then the devil leaveth him, and behold, angels came and ministered unto him. One of the passages from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, states: "We lose the high significance of omnipotence when after admitting that God, or good, is omnipresent and has all-power, we still believe there is another power named evil. This belief that there is more than one mind is as pernicious to divine theology as are ancient mythology and pagan idolatry."
