

Ten-Pay Plan for Old Taxes Ending This Month

HEAVY PENALTIES BEING RESTORED

The ten-payment plan of paying delinquent taxes, in operation since 1933, will expire this month, H. L. Byram, county tax collector, pointed out this week. Taxpayers having real estate taxes for 1936-37 or prior are advised that Aug. 20 is the last day to redeem their property with the present liberal interest charge. The recent special session of the Legislature refused to extend the plan beyond that date.

It is also the last day to place the delinquencies under the ten-payment plan. The provisions do not apply where 1937-38 is the only year delinquent.

Under the present provisions of the law, interest is charged at seven percent per annum from July 1, 1936, and there are no penalties added.

No Further Extension
After Aug. 20, Byram points out, penalties will be computed from the original date of delinquency which will greatly exceed the present interest charge. Besides, total delinquencies then must be paid in lump sums with no installment payments permitted.

"No further extension of the ten-payment plan can be made except by the Legislature which does not meet until next January," stated the tax collector. "From the attitude expressed by the various members at the last session it would appear that no further extension will be granted."

Taxpayers who have not secured statements of the amount required to pay their delinquent taxes by Aug. 20, should attend to the matter without further delay as the time left is very short.

A recent check shows the tax collector's office to have approximately 24,000 ten-payment accounts in good standing, involving approximately 33,000 parcels of property. Collections on de-

New Philco Radio Feature Revealed

Three members of the Star Furniture company staff, Steve Schmidt, Frank Higgins and Ed Bowman, attended the luncheon meeting at Hotel Huntington in the new 1939 line of Philco radios was revealed together with Philco's latest feature, "Mystery Control."

This gadget, according to Schmidt, is the "greatest single engineering advancement that has been made since the invention of radio itself." More than 2,000 dealers, their servicemen and retail salesmen, attended the demonstration.

"Mystery Control" is a small brown box, no larger than a box of cigars and weighing little more," Schmidt explained. "On the top of it is a dial similar to a telephone dial. With this dial eight stations can be controlled on a companion Philco from any place whatsoever between the 'Mystery Control' and the radio. Not only can eight stations be controlled but the volume of those stations can be controlled absolutely. Also, the 'Mystery Control' enables the operator to turn off the radio.

"Philco engineers tell us that neither the photo electric cell nor the radio beam, which have been used previously in the remote control of typewriters, airplanes, submarines, doors, etc., are employed by Philco in achieving the remote control of their radios. Just what constitutes the new mysterious force that is utilized by 'Mystery Control' has not yet been divulged."

Two Groups Endorse Alondra Perfume Project

Endorsement of the proposed perfume project for Los Angeles county was filed with the board of supervisors this week by the Pacific Rose society, over the signature of Fred W. Walters of La Canada, president. Medicinal plants also are included in the list which the backers of the plant project desired to experiment with at Alondra Park, at the northern edge of Torrance.

The Pacific Rose Society, with a membership of 150, urged the supervisors to press its application for a WPA project, rather than turn the project over to some other agency to carry out. A similar endorsement was filed with the supervisors this week from the Pasadena Horticultural association, with a membership of 240. The supervisors this week were awaiting an opinion from the county counsel's office as to whether any county department could legally sponsor the project.
