### JUDGE BRIDGE LAUDS COURTS' HUMANITY

Judge Collamer A. Bridge was here on business in connection with his candidacy for Office No. Two, Justice of the Peace of Inglewood Township this week. He spoke forcefully and favorably upon the changed attitude exhibited by the Courts in more recent times in dealing with new problems confronting them.

"Heretofore, when a law suit was tried it became necessary for the Court and the attorneys to spend much time searching law books in an attempt to find a so-called precedent of a case involving similar facts, and thereupon the Court felt obliged to follow the ruling in the older cases," he said.

"In more recent times, however, it has been refreshing to note that although the Courts still give ample protection to property, they now seem much more than formerly concerned with the human and humane phases of the cases presented to them. In other words, the rights of persons are much more zealously guarded than formerly."

It is with confidence based on 14 years of service on the bench that Superior Judge Walter S. Gates enters his candidacy for re-election to Office No. 2 on the Sept. 30 ballot.
