(Continued from Page 1-A) south of 235th for an unestimated yield from 4,901 feet. Freeman Holding company is rigging a pump to finish Baxter No. 1 on the southeast corner of 235th and Pennsylvania. McDonald and Burns have added Moore No. 10, flowing 265 barrels of 26.8 gravity cutting 2.6 percent from 5,504 feet.

While activity continues around the Blue Bell Oil's wildcat on 241st street, no one around the site would hazard a report on recent findings or what the firm mentions are. The last report was that the operators were plugging back after drilling to 5,240 feet and encountering only barren gray sand.

Andrews and Mitchell are preparing to deepen W. A. Kirk No. 10 west of Eshelman and north of 235th street. Alford and Thompson are rigging to deepen the old Julian well northwest of 235th and Eshelman and Madill Oil is scheduled to start deepening the old Shell Frenger No. 4 on the northeast corner of Hawthorne and Redondo-Torrance boulevard. L. M. S. Oil is rigging to drill its No. 1 at the southeast corner of 235th and Eshelman. Pacific Western Oil has staked location north of 235th and Eshelman and Madill Oil has completed No. 1 on the southwest corner of 237th and Pennsylvania, yielding mostly water from 4,920 feet.

G. P. Completing Well
Rolling Hills Petroleum is reported to have struck oil sand and shale at 5,105 feet in its wildcat, Weston No. 1 near Walters, and is preparing to set casing at 5,050 feet at which depth first showings were noticed.

General Petroleum obtained a water shutoff early this week on its Poggi No. 9 in the Harbor City extension and is getting ready to undertake its completion. This well is located north of the D and B. The Poggi No. 9 was drilled to 5,426 feet, found minor showings, plugged back to 5,280—one mile deep—and made the shutoff at 5,120 feet. Production will be attempted between the two latter depths.

Sears Return from Rail-Motor Trip

Mr. and Mrs. Dean Sears returned early this week from a combined rail and motor trip that took them as far east as Lansing, Mich., where they took delivery on a new car. The return trip, 3,475 miles was by way of Kansas, and then north to the tip of Minnesota and west thru the Bad Lands of South Dakota to Yellowstone National Park. Gertrude Lawrence Stars in "Susan and God" at Biltmore Soon

The distinguished international stage star, Gertrude Lawrence, will begin a limited engagement in Rachel Crother's brilliant comedy "Susan and God" at the Biltmore theatre, Los Angeles, Monday evening, Sept. 12, for three weeks only.

John Golden, the producer of "Susan and God," is making theatrical history by sending the entire company intact direct from the Plymouth theatre in New York, where it established the season's record longevity run, to Los Angeles. Miss Lawrence has long been considered one of the finest actresses in both America and England. Her splendid portrayal of Susan caused her to receive the gold medal of the New York Academy for the best theatrical performance of 1937 and 1938, and Miss Crother, the author of the play, was awarded the gold medal of the theatre group for the outstanding American play of the season.

Miss Lawrence is accepted as one of the most versatile players on the stage. She appeared in every variety of role from musical comedy to tragedy. Her first American appearance was made in Charles' "Revue," nearly 14 years ago, and, before her appearance in "Susan and God," she was co-starred with Noel Coward in "Tonight at 8:30." Miss Crother, who is responsible for many notable plays, in "Susan and God" has written the most outstanding success of her career. It is a comedy that frequently arises to dramatic heights.

The story in brief concerns the flighty Susan Trexel, who returns from England imbued with a new religious fervor which threatens to disrupt the lives of her friends and associates, just as her other fads have disrupted her own home, driving her husband Barrie to drink and shunting her adolescent daughter Blossom away to boarding school. In the end, of course, Susan discovers that through religion is love, and the Trexel family is reunited.

It is generally conceded that, as Susan, Miss Lawrence is doing the best work of her career. Miss Lawrence will not appear anywhere else in Southern California, her stage engagements being confined to Los Angeles and San Francisco. Because of this, large patronage is expected from the surrounding territory, and the Biltmore theatre has made special arrangements to take care of many orders from outlying points and to provide suitable reservations for visitors from outside the city.
