### INDUSTRIAL INTERESTS:

Mrs. Ellwood J. Munger of Whittier, chairman of Industrial Interests, is leader of an entirely new division. She does not plan to hold regular conferences during the year but will conduct forums or study groups where problems will be discussed by the clubwomen themselves without the help of outside speakers. Also a part of the General Federation and State Federation work this division is new in Los Angeles District, Mrs. Munger feels it should be given conscientious consideration and studied from all angles. She has prepared a comprehensive outline for the year's activities based on intensive study, careful investigation, thoughtful conclusions and practical action.

Mrs. Munger says: "An attempt will be made to gain a general knowledge of a few of the basic laws of economics as they affect industrial problems; to arrive at the real definition of terms commonly employed in discussing this and kindred subjects, that we may have a common basis for judgment. We propose a detailed study of current labor problems, particularly those of immigration into the state and of the migrants already here; and a study of recent labor laws and proposed laws. For this purpose recognized textbooks, current books, articles and reports will be used. Booklists for lighter reading will be made available."

With this program a deeper understanding of many industrial problems should be reached during the year, if not wholly solved under the able direction of Mrs. Munger. # Fall Music Classes Open at Buffington Studio

Every summer Mrs. Buffington attends the outstanding normal training courses given in Los Angeles in her endeavor to be constantly on the alert for the latest and best in music education. She is also an accredited teacher with the State Board of Education, which en-

titles high school students studying piano with her to receive high school credit and grades for piano study.

**Supervised Practice**  
For the past four years students who study with Mrs. Buffington have had the advantage of duo-piano work, and further experience in ensemble playing is provided by grouping students in trios and quartets. Musicianship and individuality are developed in the youngest child of four as well as the most advanced students. Mrs. Buffington has been especially successful in rebuilding and redirecting students who have studied rather aimlessly and with no particular plan of study, enabling them to plan a definite course and carry it through.
