(Continued from Page 1-A) aries . . . at \$10,000 a year," without mention of the present figure, so that many voters who might favor lowering salaries may vote "no" and defeat their own purpose, it was pointed out.

Civil Service Measures
The third proposal would permit detaching county parks and recreation areas from supervision of the county forester, so that a special department might be created to handle them. Little opposition is expected to this measure.

The fourth proposal would exempt field secretaries, who are political "contact" men for the supervisors, from civil service, since by the nature of their jobs, they virtually violate civil service provisions now in properly carrying out their duties.

The fifth, and by many considered the most important proposal, would put "teeth" into county civic service regulations by giving the civil service commission veto power over demotion or dismissal of civil service employees of the county, a protection they do not now have.

Props. 3 and 4 Explained to Legionnaires

Taxes on gasoline and on motor vehicles will be diverted from misuse and from increase through the provisions of Propositions 3 and 4 on next month's ballot, according to Joseph M. Kaplan, of the Automobile Club of Southern California who spoke before the American Legion post here Tuesday evening.

Proposition 3, Kaplan stated, is a constitutional amendment which would permanently prohibit use of traffic taxes for non-traffic purposes. This diversion, he pointed out, has resulted in tax increases in states where it has been practiced, and has also brought about the suspension of highway projects employing thousands of workers.

A coordinated system of highway administration would be set up by Proposition 4, the speaker said. Units of state highway administration are at present scattered among various departments, so that cooperation is difficult or impossible. Proposition 4 would group these units in a single department, under the State Highway Commission, Kaplan pointed out.

Local Firm Expects to Get Road Job

Basich Brothers, Torrance contracting firm which has built some of the larger state highway links in the state, submitted the low bid and is expected to be awarded the contract this week for a \$90,204 job on the Kane Springs-Oceanside highway at La Jolla Indian reservation in San Diego county. The job is a Federal lands highway project.

Creates Fleet Impression

All three series bear a general resemblance in the graceful treatment of flaring, low-valanced fenders, smartly tailored metal trim, smoothly contoured all-steel turret top bodies and safety steel wheels with massive chromed hub caps. The front end of the hood curves downward to meet the narrow, die-cast radiator grille, creating a fleet, close-to-the-road impression and affording the driver a marked advantage in foreground visibility. The aprons on either side of

the radiator grille carry low, bullet type headlamps, recessed above horizontal chrome louvers which provide additional air inlets for efficiency engine cooling. The following body models are available in all three series: business coupe, club coupe, two-door sedan with trunk and four-door sedan with trunk. In addition, a convertible coupe is offered in the Seventy and Eighty Series.
