**Chocolate Mocha Frosting**  
2 tablespoons butter; 2 1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar; 1/4 teaspoon vanilla; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1/4 square unsweetened chocolate, melted; 3 tablespoons strong coffee.  
Cream butter; add part of sugar gradually, blending after each addition. Add vanilla, salt, and chocolate, alternately with coffee, until of right consistency to spread. Beat after each addition until smooth. Make enough frosting to cover tops of two 8-inch layers, or top and sides of six 3 1/2-inch cakes, or about 2 dozen cup cakes.

## Building Materials, Far Below 1926 Norm, Decline 6 Percent in 1938

### City Planners Launch Study of Zoning Law

Include a thorough study of all economic factors making up a city.  
These include: street and lot widths, sewage facilities, use of property, subdivision development and a general survey of a city's background and possibilities for potential expansion.  
Williamson said. He pointed out that he works in conjunction with the public, endeavors to obtain a cross-section of local residents regarding their own property and would be always available for discussion meetings.

The Planning Commission's recommendations regarding zoning matters to be considered and playground development, tree culture, roads and streets, must be followed without change by the city council, City Attorney John Lumber, a member of the group, stated. If the council disagrees with the Commission's findings in any respect, it must ask the Commission for a reconsideration. The council cannot change details of recommendations, McCall said.

**COUNTY PLANNING CONFERENCE CALLED**  
Problems of modern planning are so inter-related that one community cannot plan intelligently without taking into consideration the effect on the surrounding areas, Supervisor John Anson Ford said today in commenting on a county-wide meeting to be held shortly.

Every city in the county will be invited to send a representative to the meeting, which will be called by Chief Engineer William J. Fox of the county regional planning commission.

"Studies of population trends and development in the coming years in Los Angeles county and all of the cities which will bring many problems affecting the social and economic status of future generations," Ford said.  
"It is obvious that such matters as business zoning, highways, sanitation lines, drainage systems and metropolitan parkways are best considered as county-wide problems. All city officials and citizens interested in the physical aspects of development of the county as one great commonwealth should be invited to a conference to devise means for close cooperation in city and county planning."

**Name Is Perpetuated For 26 Generations**  
STATE COLLEGE, Pa. (U.P.)—What's in a name? Plenty, in the case of Arthur Clement Miner of Cambridge Springs, Pa., a student at the Pennsylvania State College.

A student in civil engineering, young Miller carries a traditional family name which is now 26 generations, or nearly 900 years, old.  
The family name is Clement. When he was christened Arthur Clement at birth, he became the 26th generation of his father's family to carry the name.

Building materials, which represent approximately 55 percent of a structure's final cost, are still priced far below costs for the so-called "normal" year of 1926 and last year's figures showed a decline of six percent from the preceding year's costs, a study of U. S. Department of Labor statistics reveal.

Making public these figures this week, Charles V. Jones and A. H. Silligo, of the Torrance Lumber company pointed to the advantages to prospective homeowners who plan to build on today's market.

The cost index figures compiled by the Bureau of Labor Statistics for 1938, just made public, show that building materials as a group stood at 90.3 for the year. The basis of the 1926 average of 100. This is a decline of approximately six percent from the 1937 average cost figure, they asserted.

The significance of this decline on the total cost of a dwelling was stressed by the well-known local lumber dealer. In the field of low cost housing, in which the association anticipates greatest activity during 1939, such a drop represents an important factor, they asserted.  
"In the face of propaganda intimating that building costs are on the rise," Charles Jones declared, "these Federal statistics speak for themselves. They show that the cost of building materials is still far below normal, and that the trend over the past year has been downward."  
One of the biggest drops in material costs, as shown by the Bureau of Labor statistics compilations, was registered by lumber, whose index figure stood at 90.9 for 1938, as compared with 99 for the preceding year.
