

All America Marks 29th Boy Scout Anniversary



THIS poster, showing how "Scouting Carries On American Ideals," a theme of Boy Scout Week from Feb. 8 to 14, marks the 29th anniversary of the incorporation of the Boy Scouts of America. 39,750 Boy Scout Troops, Cub Packs and Sea Scout Ships now include 123,350 boys and men, a membership gain of better than 13% in the past year. Since the beginning of Scouting in America 8,400,000 boys and men have been identified with the Movement.

Tolson today recommended in a proclamation that all Torrance citizens observe the week of Feb. 8 to 14 as "Boy Scout Week in Torrance." 

THE AMERICAN WAY by David Coyle: In the spring of 1937 Harper's Publishing company offered a prize of \$1,000 for the best contribution on "The American way." Their reasons were: "We had heard a great deal of talk about the American way, 'American system,' etc., and we had come to the conclusion that most Americans who thought they believed in democracy and freedom were singularly ill equipped to stand up against the blasts of anti-democratic doctrine. We wished to see the essential American traditions and ideals separated from the unsentimental and the outdated, so as to form a credo presented simply, freshly and explicitly." Coyle's contribution won the prize, and sets a very high standard. Three other versions, chosen from the hundreds submitted, are published with it. They represent fine positions of slightly different points of view, and altogether result in a most worth while and readable book, one which we wish every citizen would read.

REBECCA by Daphne DuMaurier: In this magnificent novel of an unforgettable woman, full of urgency and brilliantly created suspense, the house at Manderley will hold you in thrall. Rebecca had everything; beauty, brains and breeding, and she had given a grace both regal and sparkling to the majestic loveliness of Manderley, that great domain above the Cornish sea. Maxine de Winter's second wife, young, lonely and frightened, it seemed that Rebecca was the mistress of Manderley still; that her tragic death the year before had loosened her hold on nothing, certainly not on her husband's love. But with this statement of the theme you feel you understand the plot there is great surprise in store, for the story with its twist of plot quite astonishes the expectant reader.




