Average production per well in the deep zone is now about 78 barrels per day from 13 wells as compared to 123 barrels from 125 wells on Oct. 1. The newly developed area southwest of 224th and Eshelman has not been on production long enough to make any determination. These familiar with the field say that the decline for the new area should not be as great as in the rest of the field, for altho the wells are closely spaced, they are all beared back considerably. "Pope of Peace" Pope Pius XI was especially noted for his love of children and many were present to take part in the Service of the Mass and to recite their small rosaries for him. Several of the little girls wore black veils. Tall lighted candles streamed their waken light over the solemn assembly—an assembly that was being repeated in scores of churches thruout the archdiocese of Los Angeles. Many of the congregation lighted tapers before the service began, adding their intercession for the Holy Father thru their patron saints. Black vestments were worn by Rev. Father Joseph V. Fitzgerald, celebrant of the mass. Declaring, in his sermon devoted to eulogy of the Holy Father, that the world found Pope Plus a "tower of strength in these troubled times," Father Fitzgerald continued by saying that "All of Christendom and every country on earth mourns the passing of this great man. "He was known more as a leader than for his great intellect. As a young priest he was surrounded by little children and never lost his devotion to them, characteristic of his gentle nature. His achievements were many. He will go down in history as one of our greatest Popes and as the Pope of Peace, a gracious Father who devoted his waning strength in attempting to bring an end to the international troubles afflicting his people," Father Fitzgerald said. (Continued from Page 1-A) member of the Chamber of Commerce, are assisting along another. "The only thing that will keep us from opening a Junior College here in September is lack of enrollment. We must have at least 120 enrollees ready to enter the institution to start. The faculty will be built around that number or more if the attendance is greater—and we hope it will be. Two Things to Do "It behooves all of us who are interested in the development of Torrance to put our shoulders to this educational wheel and thus expand our school system locally. There are two things to do—first, all of you to assist in this. First of all contact former high school graduates who are not attending college. See as many as you can and tell them about our plan for a Torrance Junior College. Tell them to get in touch with me so that if they become interested in continuing their education right here at home they can begin planning their studies now. "Second, urge any prospective student to send in his postcard questionnaire, properly filled out and signed, as soon as possible. If any of your prospects have not yet received one of the postcards, let me know and I'll see that they get them. "We intend to offer Junior College courses that the students want and give them the higher education they need. We intend to move the seventh grade back to the Torrance Elementary school, let the eighth, ninth and tenth grades compose our Junior high school and the 11th and 12th grades be our Senior high school. The 13th and 14th grades would be the Junior College divisions. Clubs Supporting move "Contacts have been made at Marbonne high school in Lomita, at Gardena high school and Redondo Beach Union high school and we are assured that former students of those institutions will be reached by our postcard survey. Any other high school graduates in this area who are interested in going on to Junior College should let us know at the high school here at once," Elson concluded. The Rotary clubs of Torrance and Redondo Beach have evinced much interest in the Junior College proposal and their members are joining with Torrance Kiwanians in supporting the movement and Elson's postcard survey.
