FIRST MASS IN NEW CATHOLIC CHURCH NEXT SUNDAY

Pastor Extends Invitation to Attend Rites

An hour and a half after Rev. Father Joseph V. Fitzgerald celebrates Low Mass in the little frame Catholic Church of the Nativity on Cota avenue next Sunday morning, he will officiate at a High Mass in the imposing new Spanish Colonial edifice at the corner of Engracia and Manuel avenues.

The first Mass in the new church, which will be a notable event in the church calendar, is scheduled to start with a procession of Monsignor and priests from surrounding parishes from the Torrance parish priest's house adjoining the entrance of the \$25,000 structure. The last Mass in the old church will start at 7:30 o'clock and the first service in the new building is to begin at 9 o'clock.

Formal dedication of the structure that workmen are now rushing to completion will not be held until some time after Easter, Father Fitzgerald said today. At that time Archbishop John J. Cantwell will come here to consecrate the building.

Impressive Ceremonies
Rev. Father Noel Dillon of St. Columkill's church in Los Angeles will have the honor of preaching the first sermon in the new edifice. Altho the death of the late Pope Pius XI and the fact that it is Lent have somewhat curtailed traditional pomp and ceremonies attendant on the opening of a new Catholic church, the Sunday morning rites will be most impressive.

Immediately following the early morning service in the old church, Father Fitzgerald, accompanied by acolytes and visiting Monsignor and priests will convey the Blessed Sacrament to the new altar. Following the first mass in the new church, at 11 o'clock, the first of the Forty Hours' Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament will begin with a High Mass.

This period of prayer and meditation will continue until Tuesday morning at which time there will be the ceremony of the reposition of the Blessed Sacrament into the tabernacle of the altar.

Second in U. S.
Father Fitzgerald is expressing his thanks and appreciation to all Catholics and non-Catholics who contributed so generously toward the church building fund, cordially invited all interested residents of Torrance and vicinity to the first services Sunday.

The new church was started last September. The building fund was established a year before that. Present plans call for the transformation of the old church into a parish hall for entertainments and socials.

From its imposing facade, with its 60-foot tower crowned by glazed tile and lantern of copper, to its severely plain liturgical altar, the new edifice follows a traditional Catholic architectural motif centuries old. There is, however, only one other church like it in the United States and that is the Tucson Catholic church, some 20 years old.

Beautiful Nativity Scene
The nave will seat about 410 people. One of the outstanding details is the entrance in carved stone with a beautiful hand-wrought Nativity scene, symbolic of the church's name, directly above the door. Within its stucco walls, the church contains a large choir gallery, elevated sanctuary, priests' sacristy and altar boys' vestry rooms, side altars, confessionals, a baptistry and a large vestibule.
