

County's Retrench Policy Hits Parks
 Spence D. Turner, director of the county parks and recreation department, was notified this week that the board of supervisors has declared a general policy of retrenchment as to parks and playgrounds for the coming year.

Existing parks and playgrounds will not be developed during the next year, except as to provide normal or ordinary recreational activities, Col. Wayne Allen, chief administrative officer, notified Turner.

PLANE CRASH BLAME LAID TO PILOT
 Blaming carelessness of the pilot in flying low for the sudden deaths last Sunday evening of two men whose lives were snuffed out in a plane crash on a plowed field at 148th street, 200 feet east of Main street, a coroner's jury completed an investigation of the accident Tuesday afternoon.

The victims of the crash, caused when the wing tip of a borrowed plane snapped a high tension line, were Robert E. Grett, 26, of 1019 West 93rd street, Los Angeles, and Captain Samuel D. Hogan, 38, of Hynes. The inquest revealed that Karl Christiansen, roommate of Grett, and operator of a flying service at 9105 South Western avenue, loaned the two-seater plane, belonging to a Hollywood man, to Grett.

Grett, a carpenter and student pilot licensed to transport passengers, took off alone from the field and evidently picked up Hogan, a captain in the County Fire Department, at some location not known at the present time. The only witness to the crash, W. D. Gillipie, of Lynwood, who was sitting in a parked car, said the plane was flying low but its motor was apparently functioning well just before it crashed.

 lished by Charles Scribner's Sons.
Ickes' Complaint
 The letter from Secretary Ickes complaining about the use of the word "Hoover," dated Jan. 17, 1938:

"Dear Homer: On page 4 of of (your) bill of complaint in the case of the U. S. A. plaintiff, vs. the State of Arizona, defendant, there is a reference to 'water discharged at Hoover (Boulder) Dam'. Having gone to great lengths to give Boulder Dam its original and proper name which my predecessor of office attempted feloniously to take from it, for which praiseworthy and meritorious public act, I have been roundly condemned by reactionary Republican papers in all parts of the country, I may say that the reference in this bill of complaint to 'Hoover Dam' gives me nothing at all to cheer about. I should have been glad to point out what was undoubtedly merely an inadvertence but I lacked the opportunity, since I did not see the bill of complaint until after it had been printed and filed with the Supreme Court."

Following is the reply of Attorney-General Cummings:
"Dear Harold: This acknowledges your letter of the 17th of January about Boulder Dam, and I am not surprised by your perturbation. Even in the midst of great events the use of a cherished name is apt to be upsetting.

It's On Contract
 "The difficulty in this particular instance seems to grow out of the fact, that while the term 'Boulder Dam' is used as often as possible and scattered somewhat promiscuously in strategic places in the bill of complaint, nevertheless the drafters of that document seemed to feel it necessary in describing the dam to use the title employed by Congress in acts appropriating money for its construction."

"I believe these acts refer to the dam as 'Hoover Dam' (see 46 stat. at large 1146:47 stat. at large 1181: 48 stat. at large 538). Moreover, the dam is referred to as 'Hoover Dam' in the contract between the United States and the Metropolitan Water District under which contract, I understand, the dam is actually being constructed. Our department was not aware that you had officially rechristened the dam, but that had been my change in its technical name since the order of Secretary Wil-

 budget for the current fiscal year. Therefore, we would suggest that, inasmuch as the Townsend club is a regular dues-paying organization, it be allowed to use the Auditorium upon payment of the regular rental tariff as prescribed by the Torrance City Council.

"We wish it understood that our suggestion is in no sense discriminatory in view of the aforementioned conditions."

Third Request Laid
 Clerk Bartlett, after receiving the chamber's replies, said yesterday that the council will undoubtedly follow the policy of charging rental for the use of the Auditorium and will so inform the Townsend club. Regarding the subsidy for the Players, he said that councilmen have indicated they will grant the \$70 requested from recreational funds.

A third request from the city clerk, on behalf of the city council, for a recommendation concerning the application of the Torrance Junior Musicians' Society for \$400 for "incidental expenses to send that group to the San Francisco Fair" arrived too late for inclusion among the chamber directors' business Tuesday. It will be considered later.

During the discussion of the subsidy requests, chamber directors were emphatic in pointing out that the council is subjecting the organization to considerable adverse comment by asking for recommendations on subsidies which do not come within jurisdiction of the booster organization.

Members of the council were present and they were urged to confine the city's business to their board without intruding the chamber into the consideration of subjects alien to the latter's function as advertising and promotion for the community.

Migratory Influx to State Declines

The number of migratory workers entering California to seek employment decreased by 19,926 to a total of 85,000 during 1938, a report to the board of supervisors revealed today. Largest number, 13,212, came from Oklahoma, with Arkansas second with 10,868.
