

# Juvenile Delinquency Subject of Address at N.B.P.W. Group Here Monday

## Local Club Now Has Largest Membership in Nine Years

"Delinquency," according to George Grift, representative of the Los Angeles County Juvenile Protection Division, "is the failure to comply with laws as they affect the social order of everyday living." He was the speaker at the monthly dinner meeting of Torrance National Business and Professional Women held in St. Andrew's guild hall Monday evening.

"Increase in crime among juveniles is growing year by year and has now reached an appalling figure," Grift said. "The urge to do wrong originates in the minds of children when quite young and adults are prone to list these things as child's play. This is the cause of many juvenile mistakes. Wrongs must be rectified when minor so that major delinquencies may be averted."

Listing the means of penalizing youths for misdemeanors, Grift pointed out the good and not so good methods and explained how each method affects the individuals, when they are returned to community life. He urged cooperation of service clubs with coordinating councils, which are doing splendid work in Southern California, teaching youth the use of leisure time and wholesome recreation.
