

Churches Plan Pre-Easter Services; Good Friday Devotions in Auditorium

PASTORS TO SHARE PULPIT HERE DURING HOLY WEEK

A series of pre-Easter union church services will be held at the Central Evangelical church, Marcelina and Arlington avenues, during Holy Week, beginning Tuesday evening, April 4, at 7:30 o'clock, under the auspices of the Torrance Ministerial Union. Special music and sermons dealing with facts of Christian religion will be given each night.

Rev. F. T. Porter of the First Christian church, will speak Tuesday evening. Rev. Harry Banks of the Methodist church will give the sermon Wednesday evening, and Rev. C. M. Northrup will deliver the communion sermon Thursday evening when the Lord's supper will be observed. Appropriate candle lighting and special music is being planned for the series of devotions.

The services on Good Friday, April 7, will be held in the Civic Auditorium at 7:30 p. m., when the cantata, "The Seven Last Words of Christ on the Cross" will be presented by the Cathedral chorus of Los Angeles. This group is composed of 40 voices, directed by Carl Robertson, a student of George S. Lueddeke, who will appear in the program as a soloist.

These services are open to the public with no admission charges. Free will offerings will be received.

HELPS FOR... HOUSEWIVES

One of the best coverings for an ironing board is new unbleached muslin, washed to remove the starch. Regular ironing board covers are sold at moderate prices. Don't think just any old covering will do—efficient coverings save much time and energy.

Do you like baked bananas? Then here is a suggestion for a main-course food for breakfast, luncheon or supper: Split bananas, stuff them with small link sausages. Bake 25 minutes in a moderate oven.

When buying mats and doilies for the dining table remember that those of rectangular shape provide a wider space for silver and glasses than oval or round ones. Arrange the doilies about a fourth of an inch from the edge of the table.

Here's a bacon appetizer trick: On small crackers spread cheese mixed with salad dressing, top with bacon squares and bake or broil until the bacon is crisp and

the crackers a delicious brown. Serve hot.

Give your table linens a light coating of starch; just a little, remember. Stains and spots do not seem to penetrate surfaces with a little finish so easily. This is especially suggested for mats and doilies.

Hot, mildly seasoned tomato juice carried in vacuum jars will be most welcome at skating parties or any other outdoor activities. Don't forget to take some paper drinking cups along, too.

For unusual flavor blend add a little dry mustard, chopped onions and minced butter to buttered green beans.
