

Book Reviewer Also Discusses World Affairs

Commenting on world affairs, Gladys Henry Scoles held her audience of some 75 members and guests of the Torrance Woman's club in rapt attention yesterday as she related the program made by Germany since 1933 and compared the six-year conquest by Adolf Hitler to that of Napoleon's 14-year attempt to dominate Europe. Mrs. Scoles then spoke on the situation in this country and her impression of the effect present day politics will have on the years just ahead. She gave a brief review of "Union Now," written by a foreign news correspondent, Clarence K. Streit. In this book the author advocates a union for all democratic countries in which all countries shall be represented according to their population. Streit believes this to be the way out of the world's present dilemma. Other books reviewed briefly by Mrs. Scoles were "Albert Einstein" by H. Gordon Gardner; "Teaching For The Stars" by Nora Wain; "The Pilot," by Pearl S. Buck and "Mamba's Daughter" by Dorothy and DuBose Hayward. Miss Jean Patterson, friend of Mrs. Scoles presented her to the club.
