"Are Sin, Disease, and Death Real?" This question is the subject of the Lesson-Sermon on Sunday in all Churches of Christ, Scientist. The Golden Text is from the book of Exodus: "I am the Lord that healeth thee."

The Lesson-Sermon includes this verse from Jeremiah: "Blessed is the man that trusteth in the LORD, whose hope is in the LORD." These words of the Psalmist are also presented: "Bless the LORD, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits: Who forgiveth all thine iniquities; who healeth all thine diseases; Who redeemeth thy life from destruction; who crowneth thee with lovingkindness and tender mercies; . . . The LORD easeth thy right reins and judgment for all that are oppressed."

Among the passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, are the statements: "Sin, sickness, and death are comprised in human material belief, and belong not to the divine Mind. They are without a real origin or existence. They have neither Principle nor substance, but belong, with that is material and temporal, to the nothingness of error, which stimulates the creations of truth." "God pronounced good all that He created, and the Scriptures declare that He created all."

Ceremonies of Holy Week Drawing Toward Close

OBITUARY

JOHN EDWARD WILLIAMS, succumbed at the age of 68 at his home, 1870 Santa Fe avenue, late last week after an illness of several months. A native of England, Mr. Williams had lived here for 17 years and was a machinist for the National Supply company. He was survived by his widow, Mrs. Constance Jane Williams, and a son, David, of this city and a daughter, Daniel V. Williams of San Rafael.

The funeral service was held at Stone and Myers chapel Saturday afternoon with Rev. Thomas Marshall, vicar of St. Andrew's Episcopal church, officiating. Graveside ceremonies were held at Inglewood Park by the Santa Ana unit of the Canadian Legion.

REV. FATHER MICHAEL F. FITZGERALD, brother of 24 years. His brother, Rev. Father Joseph V. Fitzgerald died at his home in New York City. He was 49 years of age and had been a priest for 24 years. His brother, Rev. Father Francis Fitzgerald of Brooklyn, N. Y., officiated at the Requiem Mass, which was attended by his uncle, Monsignor Maurice Fitzgerald and Bishops Donahue of New York and Carney of Rochester. Solemn Requiem Mass at the Church of the Nativity was celebrated here Monday morning in honor of the deceased by Monsignor Schappell of Wilmington.

MRS. MADORA A. LEAKE, mother of Dr. Norman A. Leake of this city, died March 23 at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Alice Collins, in Los Angeles. She was 85 years old and had been ill only a short time. Mrs. Leake was born in Ohio but lived most of her life in Kansas. She came to California with her husband, who died 19 years ago, in 1888.

In addition to her physician here and daughter in Los Angeles, Mrs. Leake was also survived by three other sons, Francis J. Leake of Fresno and E. L. and F. J. Leake of Los Angeles. The funeral service was held March 25 and interment was at Inglewood Park cemetery.

PAULINE G. WACHENDORF, mother of Mrs. Alwine Ulman, succumbed Tuesday at the Uman home, 2531 Oak street, Lomita, following an illness of several months. Mrs. Wachendorf, who was 82 years old, had made her home with her daughter for nearly nine years.

Funeral services under the direction of the A. M. Gamby Mortuary, were held this afternoon at Grace chapel of the Inglewood Park cemetery. Rev. Urban W. Hall of the South Lomita church officiated and cremation followed.

The Feast of the Last Supper is being celebrated today—Holy Thursday—through the Christian world as Holy Week nears its climactic close of Easter Sunday, Good Friday, the saddest day of Holy Week, which commemorates Christ's death on the Cross, will be observed with unusually solemn ceremonies. On that day in Rome Pope Pius XII will descend to the Sistine Chapel to attend the last Lenten sermon delivered by Father Vigilio da Valstagna, Apostolic preacher of the Capuchin monks.

Holy Saturday will find altars again vested in purple and a change in the aspect of the church from the desolation of Good Friday.

Pope to Celebrate Mass Easter Sunday will end Holy Week celebrations. The Pope is expected to celebrate high mass in St. Peter's.

Among the most treasured relics of the Passion which was shown to the faithful on Monday and Tuesday in St. Peter's was the Holy Lance which tradition says the Roman Legionnaire Longinus used in piercing Christ's side on the Cross.

In 1492 the Sultan Bajazet of Constantinople presented Pope Innocent VIII with a head-lance purported to be the weapon with which the Lord's side was pierced.

Pilgrims See Relics In St. Peter's large fragments of the True Cross and the Veil of St. Veronica, bearing the imprint of the Lord's face, were exposed to the adoration of the faithful.

Many pilgrims visited the church of St. Praxede on the Aventine Hill to see the Sacred Pillar of the Flagellation which was brought to Rome from Jerusalem in 1223 by Cardinal Colonna following a pilgrimage to the Holy Land.

Others witnessed the remnants of some boards, darkened by age, said to have belonged to the Sacred Temple on which Christ gave the Last Supper to the Apostles. These are preserved in St. John's in Lateran.


