ARTIE SHAW COMING TO PALOMAR

Answering requests from thousands of Southern California dancers, Artie Shaw and his orchestra, hailed by critics from coast-to-coast as "the band of the year," will make their initial appearance in Los Angeles at the Palomar, Wednesday evening, April 19.

Shaw has soared to international fame in the short space of two years with his unique swing-style, and is perhaps best known for his arrangement of the Cole Porter song, "Begin the Beguine," which sold more copies in record form than any other popular tune during the past year.

Helen Forrest, swingstress, and Tony Pastor, rhythm stylist, will appear as featured vocalists with Shaw, whose Palomar engagement will follow close of George Olsen's successful six weeks' stay.

Around Hollywood Film Lots

HOLLYWOOD (U.P.)—Few famous grand opera stars have been successful in motion pictures, but there is no reason why a motion picture player should not enter the field of grand opera, says Tito Guizar, Latin American screen, radio and recording star.

And as a result, Guizar is conferring with Gaetano Merola, operatic conductor to arrange for his appearance in the forthcoming season with the San Francisco Grand Opera Company.

While such grand opera stars as Grace Moore, Gladys Swarthout, Lily Pons and Lawrence Tibbett were forsaking a grand opera to try the screen, but never with any lasting success as measured by the boxoffice, Tito Guizar was building up a huge following in Latin-speaking countries as well as in America.

Guizar won a large following in Latin-America by appearing in a series of musical short subjects which were followed by his playing the lead in the musical film "Argentina" and then his appearance in "The Big Broadcast of 1935."

Interestingly enough, his real name is Frederick Arthur Guizar, but he adopted the name of Tito one day after hearing Tito Schipa sing. "I will take that name," he told his wife, "and pray that that day maybe I can sing like that."

Since then, Tito Guizar has become the favorite pupil of Schipa who predicted a brilliant career for his young protegee, perhaps even greater than Schipa's own career.

Born in Mexico City, Guizar is of French-Italian descent. He studied in Europe under the famous Italian baritone, Amato and made his debut with the Chicago Opera Company in "Mignon." He later turned from classical to popular music and won a wide reputation on the radio.

If he wins the opera role, Guizar intends to alternate between the operatic stage and the screen.

Laughton Comedy at The Lomita
