

Tartar B and C Track Squads Open Cinder Season With Wins Over El Segundo; Varsity Loses

Revealing title material among the Class C tracksters, keen competition for Class B honors but little prospects of anything but individual performances among Class A contenders, the Torrance-El Segundo track meet opening the Marine League cinder season here last Friday afternoon gave fans something to talk about.

Today, on the eve of the Torrance-Narbonne meet tomorrow, they were still talking about:

(1) The team strength of Coach Pete Zamperini's Class C spikers who captured all of the first places in the El Segundo meet;

(2) John Hall's time in the Class A mile—5:39.47 which is the fastest to date in any distance runner in the L. A. high school system;

(3) Bill Stewart's "leap for glory" of 22 feet in the broad jump;

(4) And the sterling performances of the Broberg brothers of El Segundo.

The Oilers captured the Class A varsity meet, 70 to 34, but Tartar tracksters took both the Class B (by 56 to 39) and Class C (by 55 to 22) meets. Torrance had but eight contenders in the varsity events which allowed El Segundo to win six firsts and tie for another.

Hatter's Class B 660-yard dash in 1:31.3 and Stecker's 1,320-yard run in 3:29.7 were also outstanding. Young McDonald's 660 race was a Class C feature and indicated that he is bound to go far this season.

Gaucha-Tartar Meet Friday at Lomita

Narbonne high school's new 440-yard track and athletic field will have "baptism by fire" tomorrow (Friday) afternoon when the Gauchos entertain the Torrance Tartars in a dual meet for all three track and field classes, starting at 2:15 o'clock. Narbonne will have no difficulty winning the Class A mile and should win the Marine League title in this division) because

Torrance has only about eight varsity contenders. However, the Class B and C meets should go to the Tartars with the Bee contests closely matched. Narbonne's new track is said to be the fastest in the league and several records are expected to be set on it Friday. Coaches Bill Sloan and Wayne Sloss have their Gauchos in excellent condition and the Tartars, under Coach Pete Zamperini, are ready for the fray.

Diamond Lights Going Up Fast

Workers are losing no time installing additional lighting facilities at the city park ball diamond and are well along with the job that will permit baseball games to be played there after the first of next month.

The nocturnal sport will reach a climax in July when the California State Semi-Pro Baseball tournament will be held here from July 8 to 30 with games every night and possibly Saturday and Sunday afternoons. Plans for this tourney, to determine the state championship ball club that will represent California in the National Semi-Pro Baseball Congress at Wichita, Kans., are making rapid headway, according to Commissioner Dale Riley, who is in charge of the meet.

At an adjourned meeting held last Thursday afternoon, members of the city council awarded the contract for lighting fixtures, and supplies to the California Wholesale Electrical company which submitted a bid for \$139.40. One other contract was awarded for the same time, to the Griffith Company for the improvement of the intersection of 190th street and Crenshaw at a cost of \$1,136.80.

Girls' Gym at High School Is Being Remodeled

Torrance high school girls are looking forward to completion of the remodeling of the west side of the gym. The new corrective room will be placed here, along with new offices for the instructor, doctors and nurse. The east side will be used entirely for girls' restroom.

Next year Principal Thomas Elson hopes to have the east side remodeled to give increased shower facilities. T. Yasunaga and Billy Parton, broke the old mark by running the race in 48.7.

A Few Short Worth Remembering . . .
Saturday U.S.C. and U.C.L.A. will have their annual meet, at the Los Angeles Coliseum. Louis Zamperini will have very little trouble in winning either the 880, mile or two mile event, or all three of these, if he chooses to run them. Mile run will be started at 2:30. . . . Ray Richhart, former Tartar football center, is working in Brawley. . . . Paul Smith, 17-year-old Torrance Junior could be one of the best 440-yard men in the Marine League. His first time out for track he ran 330 yards in 42 seconds, and is capable of turning the one lap event in 55 seconds or better. During the recent Easter vacation, Smith had an operation on his eyes, which, for a few weeks stopped him in his track career. But if this lad will turn out again for track, should be in the first three places when the Marine League meet is run off next month. . . . Coach Pete Zamperini is doing a fine job, in his first year as track mentor at Torrance. His ladies have already broken five school records, and expect to establish four or five more before the season ends.

Tartars Bee and C Track Teams Win First Meet

Last Friday afternoon, Coach Pete Zamperini and his scantily clad track and field boys took El Segundo in the B and C division, but lost to the Oilers in the varsity meet, proving to other members of the Marine League that they will be hard to stop in future meets of the year. Two school records were broken by the Tartars, Bill Stewart started the ball rolling, when he broad jumped—for the first time in his life—22 feet, a better Summi Ishikawa's old mark of 21 ft. 3 in. that has stood the test since 1934. Back in 1932 four lays, Bobby Wertz, Kubo, S. Ishikawa and Mura ran the 4x440 relay race, in the fast time of 49.5, but Zamperini's Class Cee boys thought that this mark was too good and had also been on the books too long, so Wallace Woods, Bobby Golden,
